

The Rock Back in Business by Fanning Average Welterweight

NEW YORK (NEA) — Rocky Graziano, a full-grown middleweight, belts Charlie Fusari, a very average welter, on the whippers, and the Happy Hoodlum is back in the big money again.

That is how easy it is for a bucks office magnet to reestablish himself in the back busting business today.

As crude and ring rusty as Graziano was, his stopping Fusari with only 86 seconds of a 10-round match left further illustrated why they put fighters on scales.

The match would never have been made in the old days, with a 10-pound difference early in the afternoon probably spreading to 15 by post-time. It's really too much for a welter to spot a middleweight.

Fusari moved in the wrong direction for nine rounds, two minutes and four seconds, yet Graziano had to punch desperately to pull the fight and his future out of the fire.

Instead of moving to his right, and away from Graziano's right-hand dynamite, Fusari moved to the left, and smack dab into it.

It was another striking demonstration of a fighter getting to the main event class knowing little about his trade. It further brought out the need for instructors.

So with everything in his favor, Graziano missed enough right hand punches to knock down a brick wall.

Meanwhile, Fusari's shells bounced off Graziano like peas fired at a battleship.

This observer and competent judges seated around him gave Fusari seven of the first nine rounds.

And the frowny Rocky acquired the seventh for no other reason than forcing the eighth and ninth were Fusari's best heats. He outboxed The Rock, and hit back when hit. Rocky Rocky went to his corner at the end of the ninth gasping and wondering.

Matchmaker Al Weil has Rocky Castellani and Steve Belloise in mind. Castellani's inexperience makes him as crude as Graziano, so he is the logical next victim. Old Steve at least knows how to move, and can punch a little.

Rocky Graziano's loyal followers will pay well to see him whack most anybody around, so it would be bad business to match him with anyone who can fight much more than a lick.

And things are too tough in the many art of mangling mugs today to break up a good racket.

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Kiner Dubious

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 22 (AP) — Home run No. 52 is in the record book—with nine games still to go—but Ralph Kiner says he doesn't have a batboy's chance of tying Babe Ruth's mighty 60.

"I simply have too much catching up to do," grinned the big Pittsburgh Pirate left fielder.

He didn't seem to be unhappy about it. In fact, he had been in a jovial mood ever since the third inning of the Boston Braves game last night when he hoisted one of Bill Vosselle's curves over the left field scoreboard. That tied his own personal record at 51, the same as he got in 1947.

Then he repeated the trick, same place and same pitcher, in the sixth inning to set a new mark for himself. The only difference was that the first one was a solo, the second one found Tom Saffell on the base path.

The three runs batted in gave Kiner 122 for the season and put him three ahead of Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson, who up until recently had a cinch on the league leadership.

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
