

Klamath Air Show Showed 1c Profit!

Three committee reports comprised the major business activity of the chamber of commerce luncheon yesterday.

The recently formed mail and express committee reported that Portland and San Francisco chamber officials have been contacted to determine if they were interested in supporting the local group's efforts to secure better service along the main line.

This action came on the heels of the winter cut in air and rail service. United Air Lines will reduce its service in Klamath Falls to one northbound and one southbound flight a day, beginning September 25. The train schedule will also include only one trip each way a day.

Joe Hicks informed the assembly that the air show committee wound up on the black side of the ledger "by one cent." He paid tribute to all those who helped promote the affair, and expected that next year's show would be "bigger and better."

Phil Hitchcock of the aviation committee recommended that a letter be sent the civil aeronautics board with reference to the proposed curtailment of some main flights through Klamath Falls.

Ex-Con Gets 10 Years For Forgery

Lawrence Steele, 31-year-old ex-convict from Minneapolis who admittedly made a profession of passing bad checks, was sentenced to 10 years in prison Wednesday afternoon after pleading guilty to a charge of forgery.

He was arrested here September 14 after trying to cash a forged check at a local grocery, and admitted to police he had flooded several Oregon cities with bad checks, usually written for from \$15 to \$30, in recent weeks.

Steele previously served 11 months of a federal prison sentence for car theft.

Also in circuit court yesterday afternoon for sentence was John Hampton Gray, 35, charged with forgery. He had no prior criminal record and was placed on probation for five years.

Gray had been held in the county jail since September 8.

Guilty Plea Entered In Morals Case

Gene Arthur Miller, 22, one of two young men jointly charged with contributing to the delinquency of two 17-year-old Kellogg, Ida, girls, today appeared in circuit court to enter a plea of guilty to the charge.

The other, 21-year-old Roy Morrison, said he believes he can beat the charge by going to trial.

Both are held in the county jail and the girls are held in the county juvenile home.

Miller, who was paroled from prison in Washington last June after serving 21 months of a 18-year car-theft sentence, waived indictment. No time was set for sentence.

Driver Fled, Nabbed, Fined

Earl C. Lewis, 26, of 1836 Ward, whom city police said they chased at 65 to 70 miles an hour through Mills addition into the suburbs late last night, was fined \$45 and given a suspended 15-day jail sentence in municipal court.

He pleaded guilty to reckless driving.

Police reported a prowl car chased Lewis' vehicle from East Main out to Eberlein to Alameda, down Alameda to Shasta way and out Shasta way to Ward before Lewis halted at his residence. He assertedly drove out Shasta way without lights in an effort to lose the prowl car.

Dr. Seth M. Kerron accepted a new portable mine safety appliance neophore with nebulizer Wednesday on behalf of the Klamath county public health department from Mrs. Everett Hotchkiss who made the presentation for the American Legion auxiliary.

The neophore with nebulizer will be kept at the health unit where it will be available to all residents of Klamath county for treatment of serious respiratory infections.

The neophore, called the plastic nose, is a new, highly effective instrument to aid in effecting artificial respiration and respiratory infections such as in cases of poliomyelitis, bronchial asthma, chronic bronchitis, pneumonia, heart cases and other respiratory cases.

A subscription drive sponsored by the Legion auxiliary made purchase of the neophore possible and it is a needed piece of equipment in the community.

were simply dealers in foreign exchange who were swapping one kind of money for other kinds of money.

This swapping of one kind of money for another kind of money is as old as business itself. It has always been with us, and it is with us still. It seems likely that it always will be with us.

HOW did it get started?

Well, that's a long story. There was a time when gold and silver were the only kinds of ACCEPTED money. But they were bulky. So merchants fell into the habit of depositing their gold and silver with people of accepted honesty and taking receipts therefor. Since they were issued by responsible people, these receipts were accepted readily AS MONEY. Because they were easier to handle than gold and silver, the practice spread.

That is how paper money got its start.

HOW did it come about that monies of different countries acquired DIFFERENT VALUES?

That is another long story and a cynically interesting one. It didn't take governments very long to discover that by DEBASING the money or inflating it, or "devaluing" it—whatever term happened to be used to describe the process—they could make their original store of honest money GO FARTHER.

It amounted to CHEATING, of course, but the theory was promulgated very early that GOVERNMENT (the king, in those days) CAN DO NO WRONG. So you see, when government cheated by debasing the money it wasn't cheating.

AS it worked out in practice, the governments (kings, emperors, khans, caesars, chiefs—what have you) cheated on different scales. Some of them mixed less lead with the gold, some of them poured in the lead with a heavier hand. Anyway, it came about that the money of different countries had different values and so the profession of money changer arose. These money changers (foreign exchange experts in the polite term) knew what was what in the way of value, and bought and sold accordingly.

Boiled down to its essentials, that is how this business of foreign exchange arose. You will note, I think, that it arose out of efforts to GET SOMETHING FOR NOTHING.
