The lumber book shelf consisting of 12 volumes, has been given to high schools in Klamath county by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company in cooperation with the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

The books cover a wide range of content and include biography, humor, legend as well as material suitable for reference. Volumes include: "The Lost Woods," by Edwin Way Teale; "Knowing Your Trees," by G. H. Collingwood and Warren D. Brush; "American Conservation," compiled by Ovid Butler; "Forest Trees of the Pacific Coast," by W. A. Elliot; "Douglas of the Fir," by A. G. Harvey; "Skyo," by Martha Hardy; "Paul Bunyan" by James Stevens; "Timber," by James Stevens; "This Fascinating Lumber Business," by Stanley F. Horn; "Burning an Empire," by Stewart Holbrook; "Tall Timber," by Stewart Holbrook, and "Now We're Logging," by Paul Hosmer.

Recipients of the book shelf were the Bonanza, Ely, Gilchrist, Chiloquin, Malin, Merrill and Henley high schools, Klamath Union high school and Sacred Heart academy.

The West Coast Lumbermen's association together with other companies in the Northwest have placed more than 150 of the shelves in high schools and colleges in Washington, Oregon and Northern California.
