The bride was attired in a grey tailored suit with black accessories, and wore a corsage of pink gladioli.

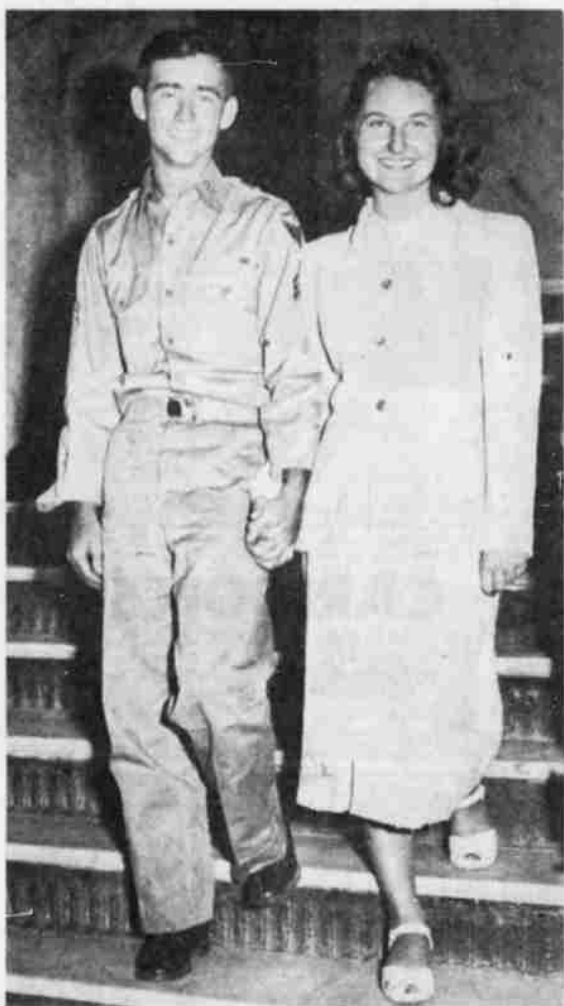
Eleven-year-old Elizabeth Van Duker was her mother's only attendant and 13-year-old Billy Van Duker was best man for the couple.
