

### 'City' Expert To Meet With KF Officials

Carl H. Chatters of Chicago, executive director of the American Municipal Association, former comptroller of the Port of New York and nationally recognized authority on city government, will meet with officials of Klamath Falls and other Oregon cities in conferences on city problems this week.

The occasion will be the joint annual convention of the League of Oregon cities and Oregon finance officers association which opens Thursday morning at the Multnomah hotel in Portland.

Attending the convention from Klamath Falls will be Mayor Robert A. Thompson, Police Judge Earl Ackerman, Councilmen G. C. Fatman, Darrell Miller, Matt Finnigan, and Wendell Smith. City Attorney Henry Perkins, Recreation Director Sam Smith and Building Inspector Walter Salsbery.

At the opening general session Thursday morning the delegates and visitors to the meeting will hear addresses by Governor McKay, Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee of Portland; Mayor George Peavy of Corvallis, League president; A. M. George, Superintendent of Bend, president of the finance officers group.

The convention sessions continue through noon Saturday.

### Former KF Man Missing

Growing fear is expressed for the fate of two Smith River, Calif., men, one a former Klamath resident, missing at sea on a fishing trip.

All point bulletins have been issued by the coast guard in its efforts to locate James "Bug" Sehorn, 36, formerly of Klamath Falls, and his companion, Ed Brewer, a retired Los Angeles businessman.

Sehorn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Sehorn of 3114 LaVerne.

The two men were last heard from August 8 when Mrs. Sehorn received a letter from her husband from San Diego, telling her of their plans to leave the following day on a deep sea fishing trip.

They recently purchased a tuna fishing craft, "The Rainbow," and obtained a 25-day permit to fish in Mexican waters as well as on the Southern California coast.

They were expected home the first week in September, but no word has been received since the August 8 letter.

Alarms have been flashed to all points by the coast guard and sheriff's office at Crescent City.

Sehorn and his wife, Ruth, and two small children, have made their home in Smith River the past three years where they operate Sehorn's Fish market. Brewer also has a wife and daughter living in Smith River.

Mr. and Mrs. V. C. Phillips of 343 Commercial, parents of Mrs. Sehorn have just returned home after spending several days with their daughter.

### KF Doctors To Attend State Meet

Three Klamath Falls doctors will be in Eugene October 12-15 as representatives of the Klamath County Medical association when the state medical society holds its 25th annual session.

Klamath delegates will be Dr. T. F. Farley, president of the Klamath association; Dr. Richard Curran and Dr. R. Wayne Eversen. Dr. Eversen represents the fifth district on the state council.

The four-day session will feature scientific papers by four leading members of the faculty of the University of Southern California school of medicine, Dr. Verne R. Mason, Dr. Albert G. Bower, Dr. Edward C. Palleis, and Dr. Hugh T. Jones. Dr. James E. Buckley of Portland will be installed as president of the society, succeeding Dr. Leslie S. Kent of Eugene, city woman physician to have served as president of a state medical society.

### \$25,000 Suit Jury Favors Bus Company

Pacific Greyhound bus line scored a double victory in circuit court here Saturday and consequently did not have to go into a \$25,000 damage suit trial previously scheduled for today.

The bus company was a jury verdict Saturday afternoon in trial of a damage suit brought by Mrs. Sadie Hopper, 45, as a result of a nearly a car-bus crash near Keno result three years ago.

Mrs. Hopper sued for \$25,000, claiming permanent injuries from the accident, and a similar suit was brought by Mrs. Grace Velda Gibson, 41, who was a passenger in Mrs. Hopper's car.

J. C. O'Neill and U. S. Balentine, attorneys for the bus company, asked that Mrs. Gibson's suit be dismissed after the jury returned its 9-3 verdict favoring the Greyhound company in Mrs. Hopper's suit.

Representing the bus company in the trial was Attorney Clarence J. Young of Portland. The jury deliberated less than 10 minutes.

### Two Hunters Suffer Wounds

Two 19-year-old Northern California hunters were wounded Sunday, one brought to Klamath Valley hospital here for treatment, the other to Yreka.

Treated here is John Rose Jr., Weed, suffering from a gunshot wound in the shoulder. His condition is reported good.

Young Rose and two companions were hunting near Dorris early Sunday afternoon when one of the three stepped from the car to open a gate. A shotgun slipped to the floor and discharged, striking Rose in the shoulder.

An unidentified hunter shot Jackie Simas, 19, Fort Jones youth, while deer hunting on Moffett Creek in the Fort Jones area 23 miles from Yreka. A companion, John Hanson of Yreka, brought Simas to the Siskiyou General hospital for treatment of a wound in the left leg above the knee. His condition is reported good from Yreka.

### Reed Retires; Miller Heads New Company

Leandro Calif., sales manager for Caterpillar tractor company. Miller said today there would be no change in personnel, either here or in Medford.

Nelson Reed, long identified with the business and community life of the Klamath basin, made this statement today:

Reed tractor sold the first Caterpillar diesel tractors successfully used in logging in this territory, replacing the old gas engine tractors then in use.

Starting in 1938, with four employes, Reed built an organization of 40 people. Since that time the firm has become well known throughout logging, farming and earth moving fields in the Klamath basin.

Along with Crater Lake Machinery company will go John Deere agency here, which covers the trade area tributary to Klamath Falls.

Crater Lake Machinery company serves Klamath Lake, Jackson, Josephine, Crook and Deschutes counties in Oregon, Modoc and Siskiyou in Northern California.

The newcomers in Caterpillar field are well known business figures in Southern Oregon. Stanley Miller came to Klamath Falls from Chicago in 1939, and since that time has been with Lorenz company.

G. C. Lorenz is a 35-year resident of Klamath Falls and heads Lorenz company.

Reuben Larson has been in Klamath Falls since April as head of Medard Equipment company. John Deere representative, which now merges with Crater Lake.

Nelson Reed said today that while retiring from the machinery business, he would continue to live in Klamath Falls and take an active interest in the community.

The impact swung her car around and it rolled over twice before coming to rest on its wheels.

The elderly woman was thrown 20 feet out of the vehicle. She was brought to the hospital by Kaler's ambulance.

### Indian Injured

Three miles north of Modoc Point Saturday night Frank Thiers, 44-year-old Modoc Point Indian, was injured in a 1934 car crash and was brought to the hospital for treatment. He was released from the hospital Sunday and immediately transferred to the county jail to serve out a 30-day vagrancy sentence previously placed against him at Chiloquin.

Thiers, a passenger in a car driven by Rudolph Elliot Moore at Modoc Point and the other car involved was driven by Herbert Lincoln Koenig of Berkeley, Calif. State police said Moore's car drove through Koenig's vehicle, throwing the latter into a ditch.

No injuries resulted Saturday night from an accident on Summers lane, but one of the drivers, 21-year-old Lonnie Dee Hatfield, 3706 Brooklyn, was booked at the county jail for drunk driving. He was released Sunday on \$300 bail.

Thiers' truck struck a car operated by Harry L. Dunn, Seattle, knocking it over and into a borrow pit.

Here in town Saturday Bobby Lee Mitchell, 24, of 619 N. 9th, was booked at the city jail on charges of reckless driving and falling to the scene of a minor accident at Spring and Main.

City police said Mitchell's car rammed into a vehicle driven by Herbert Riggs, 2327 Orchard, and that Mitchell abandoned his car in the middle of the street and walked away.

A few hours later he called the police station to report his car stolen. But the police did not work and Mitchell was arrested on the two charges. He posted \$50 bail.

This area was darkened by wind and falling limbs at 10 p. m. and a 25-minute period elapsed before crews had the power back on. The line held until 11:45 and it was black for another 30 minutes, until 12:15 a. m.

Towns people noticed bumps throughout the late afternoon and if their clocks were off 15 minutes this morning it was because a wire went down in the wind at Lakeview and Delta on the California avenue circuit. A falling limb was the cause.

Power was off on that circuit from 11:32 to 11:47 p. m. but most folks were in bed by that time.

### Ranch Murder Charge Filed

YREKA—Charges of second degree murder have been filed here against James Francis Purdon, 68-year-old Callahan miner, in the slaying of Delbert Herron, 72, Reedley, Calif., rancher.

District Attorney Fred W. Burton directed the release of Tom Stevens, operator of Mountain House on Glazelle mountain where the shooting occurred last Thursday night, and also released Burrell Barandun, Etna logger, both held since the slaying in the Siskiyou county jail.

An inquest held Friday night determined only that Herron had died of a gunshot wound but did not specify the gun.

Mr. and Mrs. Herron had come from their home near Fresno a week ago to hunt. Officers said a drinking party was in progress and Herron and Barandun were scuffling on the floor after Herron had struck Barandun with a piece of stove wood. The shooting followed.

### Two Nabbed In Lake Gaming Ban

The Lake county grand jury has been called for active session tomorrow and probably will have investigation of two gambling charges as its first business.

Two arrests, both for possession of gaming devices, have been made in Lakeview since a drive against gambling was started two weeks ago in both Klamath and Lake counties.
