The "four" were Ken Miller, Chuck Warren, Jack Taylor and Vance Matott all of them potential scorers in the field when they tucked the ball RED HURD to their tummies and started to scamper.

They might add the Owls were working on five cylinders. Dean Weekly wasn't bashful in the go department either.

I went to some lengths to explain last week that the 33 to 0 whitewash dashed out by the Fort Lewis Warriors wasn't a true yardstick on the game — and we still think it wasn't.

We'll repeat this week—the Owls 19 to 0 pasting of the Spartans did not half tell the football story on Modoc's turf Friday night.

The end positions were supposedly Dale's number one worry from the first of the season. My guess would be he's thrown away the crying towels on the performance of Pasch and Dorrier Friday night.

Clarence Adams and Norman Huff were capable fill-ins at end. Strangely enough, Chuck Warren, easily worth the price of admission with his twisting runs and uncanny change of gears that left Placer would-be tacklers dangling in the air, didn't dent the score column Friday night.

But there were few of the 2000 fans present who would disagree with the statement that the 160-pound whirling dervish was the yardstick of the Owl offense. It didn't come as a surprise, after watching Warren on the basketball court last season. He supplied the drive that ignited Tech scoring outbursts on the hardwood.

Warren registered a neat 5.3 average on 18 mail-carrying jaunts. This denotes a lot to fancy running. As far as I was concerned, Miller's 66-yard touchdown run was one of the highlights of the game and not necessarily from the standpoint of yards gained. But Ken faked the Spartan safety man with some of the best change-of-pace running I've seen in a long time.

The surprised Spartan could just as well have been a scarecrow in Uncle Joe's corn patch for the chance he had to catch Miller.

# Boston, Yanks Tie for Top

### PARNELL TAMES NY, 4-1

When Tom Yawkey, millionaire owner of the Boston Red Sox said, "Those darn Palookas of mine are going to be the American league champs," everyone thought it was a good crack.

Well, those Palookas are tied with the New York Yankees for first place in the American league today, a position they expect to better by tonight.

Lefty Mel Parnell pitched the rampaging Red Sox into a flat-footed tie yesterday as he downed the Yanks, 4-1, with a neat four-hitter before a howling mob of 35,517 fans at Boston.

The Red Sox take on the Yanks in the stadium today with Lefty Maurice McDermott 5-4 scheduled to go for the Palookas against New York's Tommy Byrne (15-7).

A triumph for either party would would just about settle the issue. Following today's battle both teams will have five games left to play including two at the New York park next Saturday and Sunday. In between meetings the Red Sox play three games with last place Washington and the Yanks three with the pesky fifth place Philadelphia Athletics.

While the Red Sox stiffened the Yanks yesterday the St. Louis Cardinals zoomed into a commanding one and one-half game lead over the Brooklyn Dodgers in the National league race. The Cards beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-1, while the Philadelphia Phils slit the Dodgers, 5-3.

St. Louis and Brooklyn, marking time today, have five and four games left to play, respectively. The Cards have three dates with the last place Cubs and two with sixth place Pittsburgh. The Dodgers have two meetings with the Phils and two with Boston.

Should the Cards win only three of their remaining five games it would assure them of no worse than a tie, providing Brooklyn takes all four of its games.

**25TH WIN**  
Parnell's triumph was his 25th of the season against seven defeats. It also was Boston's ninth straight and their 21st consecutive at home. Parnell and Kinder, who has won 23 games, have accounted for more than half of Boston's 35 victories.

Allie Reynolds pitched well for the Yanks but not good enough. The Sox reached Reynolds for two runs in the second when Johnny Pesky singled with two out and the bases loaded.

Reynolds hung on gamely until the seventh when Ted Williams ended the Yankee hopes with a 400-foot homer, his third into the rightfield seats. Johnny Pesky preceded Williams' lone hit of the game with his third hit.

Harry The Cat Brecheen tamed the Cubs on six hits and collected four of the Cards' 12 safeties. The crafty lefthander batted in three runs and was only ruffled in the fourth when Rookie Bill Serena homered.

Ralph Branca started for Brooklyn and pitched seven brilliant innings. Branca allowed only five hits and fanned nine but a blister forced him out of action.

**BANTA TAKES OVER**  
Jack Banta took over and the Phils quickly went to town. Richie Ashburn beat out a bunt and raced to third on Gran Hamner's double. Dick Sisler singled both runners home to tie the score at 3-3. Del Hniss popped out attempting to punt. Seminick, hitless in three previous swings, then whaled Banta's first pitch out of sight to break up the game.

In other National league games the New York Giants downed the Boston Braves, 3-2 and 5-2 and the Pittsburgh Pirates clipped the Cincinnati Reds, 7-3 and 5-3.

Bob Lemon turned in his 21st victory for Cleveland as he pitched the Indians to 7-1 victory over the Detroit Tigers. In other American league games the Philadelphia Athletics beat Washington, 8-5, then bowed, 4-6, to Dick Weik of the Senators in the seven inning finale. The Chicago White Sox defeated the St. Louis Browns, 7-5, and then lost, 6-2, to the Browns.

**McElhenny Injured**  
SEATTLE, Sept. 26 (AP)—The University of Washington may have lost more than a game to Minnesota Saturday. The 46-20 defeat by a powerful Gopher squad may also have cost them the services of Hugh McElhenny, flashy hard-running fullback, for a while.

The star sophomore, who gave Washington a brief lead with a 96-yard runback to score with the opening kickoff, hobbled on crutches when the squad arrived home yesterday. He sprained a foot severely on an end run late in the second quarter.

Dr. John Geehan, team physician, said it was unlikely that the sprain would be healed in time for McElhenny to go against Notre Dame this Saturday.

The husky fullback's long run, third longest on record by a Washington player, stunned the Minneapolis fans but stung the Gophers into action. Eight minutes later the score was tied by Billy Bye capping a 60-yard march by crossing from the three.

The Gophers crossed into paydirt four times in the second period. By passed 22 yards to Ralph McAllister for one, End Bud Grant scooped in a blocked punt for another, and others came on McAllister's 30-yard runback of a pass interception and an 86-yard power march.

Washington picked up two counters in the second half, scoring once in the third period as Jack Beth cracked over from the one, and again in the fourth as Don O'Leary hit Dev Gossett with a 17-yard toss in the end zone. But Minnesota matched both of them.

Thirty-five Huskies, practically the entire traveling squad, saw action. Minnesota poured in 42 men without lessening its effectiveness.

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**ANOTHER HORSEMAN** — Elmer Layden Jr., is attempting to follow in the flying footsteps of his father, Notre Dame fullback of Four Horsemen fame and later head coach. The 19-year-old sophomore halfback matriculated from Chicago's Loyola High.

## Pacific U. Bounces Western Washington

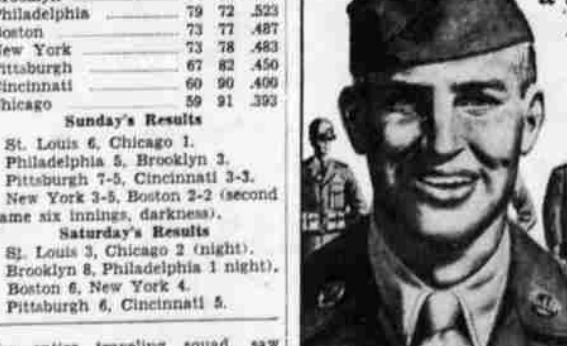
