

Fish Experts Pay Visit to Collier Park

Miami Tournament Manager, Author Try Local Streams

CHILQUIN, Sept. 28.—Two nationally known fishermen spent a week recently at Idle Rest near Collier park, trying their luck in local streams. Joe Brooks of Miami, Fla., and Don Harger of Salem reported their catch in Spring creek especially successful.

Brooks is manager of the annual Metropolitan Miami fishing tournament, which lasts from January 1 until the first of April each spring. There are 31 different types of fish included in the various contests, most of them salt water fish. The black bass is the chief fresh water fish on the list. Brooks holds the world record for a striped bass caught on a fly. It was hooked at Coo's Bay last year and weighed 27 lbs. 6 oz. He also holds a world record for a bonefish on a fly, weight 10 lbs. 9 oz.

Brooks, author of "Bass Bug Fishing," plans to publish his second book, "Salt Water Fly Fishing," this winter. He writes for the Outdoor magazine and is on the board of directors for the Outdoor Writers association of America.

The author has recently returned from Bermuda where he conducted a fish survey for the government. He has fished on the Pacific from Alaska to California and on the Atlantic from Newfoundland to Florida, covering most of the streams within those boundaries. This is Brooks' second summer trip to Oregon and it was on his first trip last year that he met his traveling companion, Don Harger.

Harger operates a small sportsman's shop in Salem, is outdoor columnist for the Oregon Statesman in which he includes a weekly fishing column, gives a weekly radio KGOO on fishing over station KGOO in Salem.

Recent articles by Harger are "Spinning for Harvest Trout" which will appear soon in Field and Stream, and one for Outdoor West in which he tells about Marion county's juvenile fishing stream. Harger will be an associate editor of the American Angler, a magazine whose first issue is to appear before the end of the month and which will be published in New York.

The Salem man is also writing some 15,000 words for the new Fishing Encyclopedia, being published by William Wise and company. His topics are steelhead flies and methods of catching steelhead, a chapter on Atlantic salmon flies and one on the principle streams of Washington and California.

Guide for the first day's fishing in this vicinity was E. H. (Polly) Rooborough, well known fly tier and fisherman. Harger planned to return to Salem and Brooks left for Baltimore, Md., where he will spend some time before returning to Miami.

WORLD SERIES QUERY IRKS PASSENGER REPRESENTATIVE

AP Newsfeatures Sports Editor NEW YORK.—Jack Sweeney has a perfect right to scream when anyone asks, "Are you going to the world series?"

Sweeney usually "sees" his world series with one ear on the radio and the other on a telephone in a hotel room close to the nearest railroad station.

When it comes to moving a world series from one city to another or getting a big league ball club out of town, Sweeney is the man who takes care of the details known as "space."

That's because Sweeney is dean of the New York Central System's passenger representatives.

"Go see Jack Sweeney," is an expression as well known to baseball officials during a world series as "kill the umpire." That's mainly because railroads run on schedule and ball games don't.

Sweeney got his baptismal run during the 1940 world series between Detroit and Cincinnati.

"We ran eight trains," he says. "But the series I'd like to forget was in 1942 between the Yankees

and Cardinals. Nobody thought the Cards would take four straight after losing the opening game. We had to break up the series specials and run baseball trains to get baseball men to St. Louis, Detroit, Chicago, Cleveland and Cincinnati."

Rain and surprise series victories are big drawbacks in arranging train schedules, says Sweeney.

Sweeney calls the '48 series one "big headache." Many thought the Indians would take four straight after losing the 1-0 opener. But the Braves bounced back with an 11-5 win and forced the series to move back to Boston.

Recently Harold Parrott of the Dodgers recalled his first trip west after he became the club's traveling secretary. It was during the war when the Dodgers used uppers and lowers.

The Dodgers had just obtained Goodie Rosen from Toronto. Since regulars sleep in lower berths, Rosen was forced to occupy an upper.

A few days with the Dodgers and Manager Leo Durocher put Goodie in the lineup against the Cards. The outfielder came up with two hits.

That night on the way to Cincinnati, Rosen noticed that his name on the posted sleeping car list still had him in an upper.

"How come I'm still in an upper?" Rosen queried Parrott. "I'm a regular now and should be in a lower."

"I'll fix that," replied Parrott. "I'll see what I can do about it."

"You got Rosen in the lineup and he's still in an upper. I have no lowers," Parrott told Durocher.

"I'll fix that," replied Durocher. "I'll get Rosen out of there."

"Where, out of the upper?" asked Parrott.

"No," replied Durocher, "out of the lineup."

SEATTLE, Sept. 28.—Hugh McElhenney's dream has turned into a nightmare. The hard-running University of Washington fullback will sit out Saturday's clash with Notre Dame—the team he had wanted to score against more than any other.

Dr. John Geehan, team phys-

cian, said today there's no way of telling how long it will take McElhenney to recover from a foot sprain received in the Minnesota game. The foot is now in a cast.

"We hope he'll be back in time for USC," Geehan said, "but it's a peculiar sort of sprain. It may take longer to heal than we think."

Short of his No. 1 fullback, Coach Howie Odell quickly shifted Left Halfback Roland Kirkby into the middle slot as insurance. He isn't expected to see too much action from that spot, however, unless something happens to Hank Tiedemann and Kenny Dunn. Tiedemann is nursing an assortment of minor ailments now but is expected to be on hand Saturday.

The Husky cause suffered another sharp blow when Leroy Perry, hard-hitting defensive tackle, suffered a broken breast bone in a line scrimmage. He'll be lost for three weeks or a month.

Washington ran through a full game scrimmage yesterday—complete with everything but kick-offs. The reserves ran their plays from Notre Dame formations with Irish plays as picked up by the Husky scouts.
