Founders Week To Be Observed

Soroptimists all over the world will join in the celebration of Founders Week, October 2 to October 8, with special meetings to commemorate the anniversary of the founding of the first Soroptimist club in Oakland, Calif. on October 3, 1921.

The Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls will meet on October 6 at the Pelican cafe for a luncheon in honor of the occasion, according to an announcement by Esther Lawler, president.

Speaker of the day will be Ida Monyer Odell, who will give a resume of the Founder Week Fund, its purpose and use.

The first Soroptimist club was founded in Oakland, Calif., on October 3, 1921. It was the outgrowth of the desire of a group of civic-minded business women executives to band together for service to their community. The club was patterned after the existing men's service organization and was limited to established, active, executive women. A further limitation was made that there should be but one member from each classification—a ruling which still holds in the American Federation.

There are now over 20,000 active Soroptimists in clubs scattered throughout the world. The aims of these clubs are to promote the spirit of service and true friendship among members; encourage work for the meritorious civic movements; the advancement of women through dignifying their occupation and aid

minor girls through education, help and personal contact.
