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## Paige, Marine Hero, Does Training Stint

CAMP PENDLETON, OCEANSIDE, Calif.—Marine Captain Mitchell Paige, 31, has just returned to Klamath Falls after undergoing a two weeks' training course as a member of the United States marine corps volunteer reserve training program at the junior infantry course school.

Capt. Paige was one of the many marine reservists, both organized and volunteer, who received active duty training at Camp Joseph H. Pendleton this year. Other Klamath Falls men who have just returned include PFC Robert R. Rowton and Sgt. Donald M. Kirkman, both men having completed two weeks of training with the regular marines.

For his outstanding heroism during World War II, Capt. Paige was awarded the nation's highest military decoration, the Congressional Medal of Honor. He also wears the Purple Heart, presidential unit citation, and a good conduct medal. Capt. Paige resides at 2679 Radcliffe with his wife, Genevieve, and children, Mitchell, 4, and Janis, 3 months.

MADRAS, Sept. 28 (AP)—Central Oregon chamber of commerce will meet October 16 at Timberline Lodge to lay plans for dedicating the Warm Springs cutoff highway.
