

Wets' Fifth Try Fails In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 28 (AP)—Oklahoma is still legally dry, and victory-flushed prohibitionists proclaimed their intent to make it literally dry too.

The fifth attempt in 42 years of statehood to repeal the state's constitutional ban on intoxicants was decisively beaten in a special election yesterday.

With 5584 out of 3720 precincts reported, the unofficial returns were: For repeal—264,061.

Against repeal—313,071.

Victory Conceded
Victory was conceded to the dry forces last night by A. G. Kulp, Tulsa attorney who headed the repeal organization incorporated as the Oklahoma Economic Institute.

The chairman of the victorious United Dry association, David C. Shapard, promptly announced a campaign for "ridding our state of bootleggers and the evils of the whisky traffic."

But the wets said the bootleggers were the real winners.

Other repeal efforts were defeated in 1908, 1910, 1936 and 1940. Mississippi is the only other state with a statewide liquor ban.

Check Back But \$560 Cash Gone

PENDLETON, Sept. 28 (AP)—Alonso Conser, Sandy, who lost a billfold with \$560 in cash and a \$2000 bank draft last Saturday while driving between Boardman and Emigrant Hill, some 62 miles, will get it back minus the cash—but with the bank draft.

Conser continued his trip to Kansas City, Monday to spend the winter, feeling pretty sad. He had spent most of Sunday retracing his route between Emigrant and Boardman, looking for the billfold. Police Chief Charles Lemons said the billfold would be forwarded to him.
