New Plane May Outrun Father Time

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—A plane that outruns the sun was mentioned last night in an address by Air Force Secretary W. Stuart Symington.

"This same plane, if it had the range," he said, "would arrive in San Francisco before it left New York. That will give worry to the time table experts."

There is a three-hour time differential between New York and the West coast.

Symington spoke at a dinner of the National Security Industrial association.

Plane Not Specified
Symington did not specify what kind of plane he was referring to, but he prefaced his reference to it with his remark:

"Man has now flown and lived at speeds hundreds of miles an hour faster than the speed of sound—which is 760 miles an hour at sea level."

The air force has admitted possession of a super-sonic plane, the K-1, but hasn't disclosed its top speed. The plane is understood to have reached a speed of close to 1000 miles an hour for a matter of seconds.

Dr. Elias Porter's Death Reported

Word of the death of Dr. Elias H. Porter, 64-year-old Medford physician and father of Bob Porter of 1966 Huron, was received here late Tuesday from Portland. Dr. Porter died following a lingering illness at Veterans hospital where he has been a patient the past six weeks.

Funeral rites will be held Friday at 2:30 p.m. from Per's Funeral home chapel, Medford, with cremation to follow.

It was Dr. Porter's request that

no flowers be sent but instead donations be given to the Alex Sparrow Foundation. Gifts may be addressed to Bob Porter at his home.

Dr. Porter was born in August, 1885, in Kentucky. He practiced medicine for many years in Medford and has made his home here since last spring with his son. He was a Spanish American War Veteran.

Survivors include the wife, Josephine, one daughter, Mrs. Berte Morse of Medford, three sons, Bob of Klamath Falls, Norris of Medford and Dr. E. H. Porter Jr., Chicago. The latter visited here early in September and will not be able to attend services for his father tomorrow. There are also 10 grandchildren.

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Foresters Have Good Safety Mark

On September 16, the Rogue River national forest completed 19 months without a lost time accident. It was announced today by Karl J. Janouch, forest supervisor. During that time, there were 128,425 man hours employment on the forest. This is the first time that any comparable year was recorded on this forest without a lost time accident.

Janouch stated that he feels especially gratified because so much of the forest work is hazardous, and that a very intensive safety campaign has been carried on in which every employee has participated. Forest firefighting is obviously dangerous, and during these 19 months there were 86 fires suppressed.

Other Work
Other field work included the maintenance of 766 miles of roads, 1032 miles of trails, 634 miles of telephone lines and 235 buildings, all located in timbered mountain areas. Much driving is necessary over steep, narrow roads, pack strings of mules are used for many trips, heavy equipment and high explosives are necessary, and considerable timber work is done in deep snows. New labor, inexperienced in forest work areas, must be hired seasonally.

Many workers are stationed in isolated locations with little chance of close supervision, including look-outs who remain on remote mountain peaks throughout the fire season. Only careful training and continual watchfulness has made it possible to escape these hazards, he said, and added that he will certainly have his fingers crossed if this story is published.

General sessions of the conference will be held in the Mills school auditorium which will be dedicated next Wednesday night. Sectional meetings will be held in Roosevelt and Fremont elementary schools and at Klamath Union high school.

Opening session is at 9 a.m. on both days.

The ranch, one of the largest in the area, was sold by James H. Barton, Spokane automobile dealer. The acre price for the rich wheat land averages approximately \$215.

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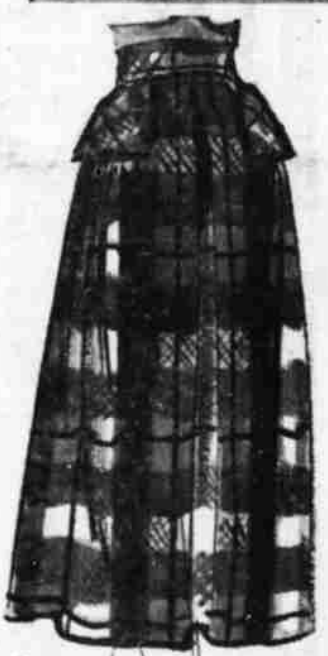
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
