

Yankees, Boston Knot Again for American Lead

Scarborough Twirls 2-1 Washington Win Over Red Sox Crew

That's the advice Boston fans are offering the Red Sox management today following Ray Scarborough's 2-1 triumph for Washington over the Sox last night that dumped the back bay millionaires into a first place American league tie with the New York Yankees.

The Sox management attempted to buy Scarborough from Washington last winter, but no soap. Owner Clark Griffith couldn't use one of Tom Yawkey's silver mines.

Scarborough, a tall 31-year-old North Carolinian, hurt the Red Sox American league pennant drive last year and his victory last night may ruin their current hopes.

The Senator right-hander beat Boston three times in 1948, including a 4-2 triumph a year ago last night that the Sox blamed for their eventual tie with Cleveland and their eventual loss in the playoffs.

Boston entered last night's game boasting an 11-game winning streak and aware that a defeat would knock them into a tie with the Yankees for the Stenglers had downed Philadelphia Athletics, 7-5, in the afternoon.

While tension mounted in the American league pennant race the picture in the National league remained unchanged due to rain in Pittsburgh and Boston. The league-leading St. Louis Cardinals' game in Pittsburgh was rained out as was the runnerup Brooklyn Dodgers' contest in Boston. The cards are one game in front of Brooklyn.

Scarborough's 13th victory was not achieved until the last half of the ninth inning. Scarborough had allowed only four hits and fanned seven but a fluke double by his opposing pitcher, young Chuck Stobbs, and Dom DiMaggio's line single resulted in a run in the sixth inning.

BLOWS UP But Stobbs, who had yielded only four blows, blew up in the ninth. The Senators put runners on first and third with only one out. Al Kousser then slashed a single to left to score Gil Coan with the tying run. Stobbs was through.

Ellis Kinder, 25-game winner, came in to relieve Sam Dente, who played brilliantly afield, greeted Kinder with a single to right but Ed Robinson, who was on second, was forced to stop at third as Al arilla fielded the ball quickly.

Lefty Mel Parnell was rushed in to face Pinch-hitter Buddy Lewis, a lefthanded hitter. The Senators put on the squeeze play but Parnell detected the move and pitched so wide to Lewis that he couldn't reach the ball and Robinson was an easy out at the plate. Kousser moving to third.

Parnell followed up the break with a wild pitch and Kousser romped home with the winning run on the errant break.

SQUEEZE PLAY The Yankees successfully worked the squeeze play in nipping the Athletics. The New Yorkers blew a 4-0 lead, the A's scoring five runs in the seventh inning to go out in front but the Yankees came right back with three in their half to win.

Lefty Alex Kellner walked Billy Johnson with the bases loaded to force home the Yankees' first run in their seventh inning rally. Phil Rizzuto then squeezed Hank Bauer home with the tie-breaking run and Kellner followed with a balk to push across the clincher.

In the only other games yesterday the Philadelphia Phillies shut out the New York Giants, 2-0, and the Cleveland Indians turned back the Chicago White Sox, 4-2.

Walters Out as Reds Skipper CINCINNATI, Sept. 29 (AP)—Bucky Walters was released as today. Warren Giles, general manager, said no successor has been chosen to succeed him.

Walters, for many years a star pitcher for the Cincinnati club, became manager on August 6, 1948. He replaced Johnny Neun while the club was in Brooklyn and in a slump.

Giles said Walters will be retained in the Cincinnati organization, but he did not disclose what kind of work he will do.

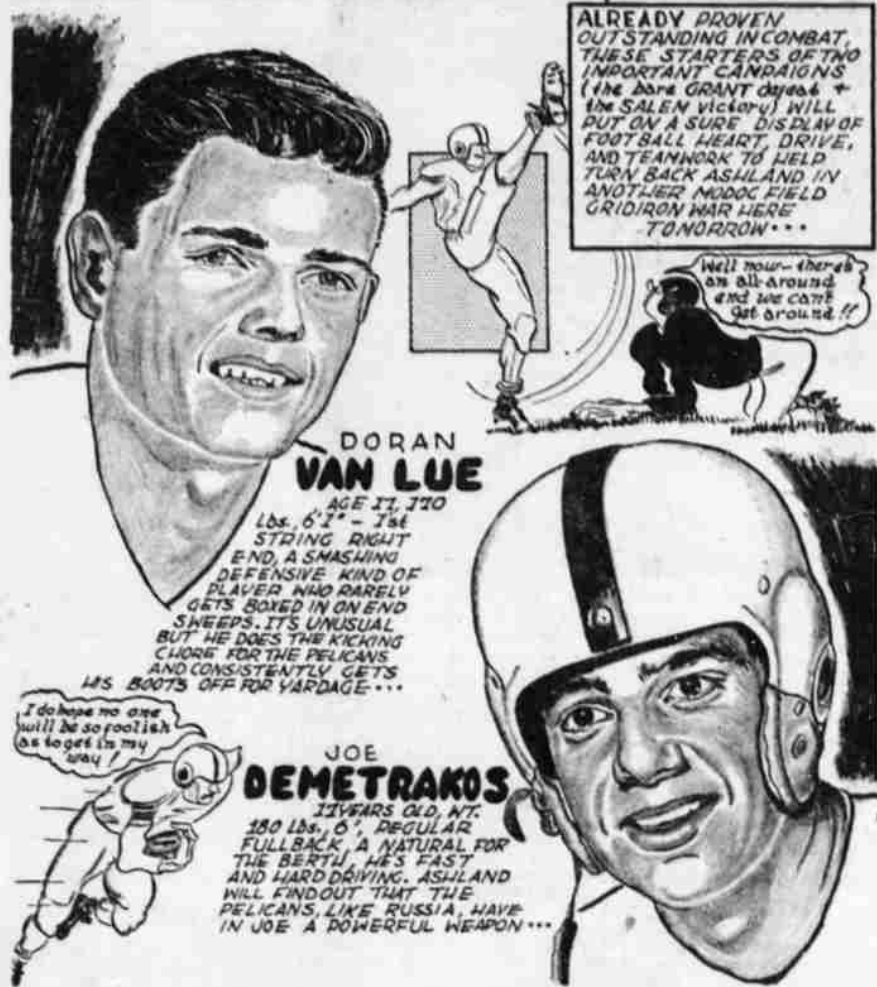
