Bear Loses Muzzle; Neilson Flees Ring

Bearded Stocky Neilson, Tennessee hill-billy, saved the day—or the night—for the fans at the armory last night when he substituted for Gordon Peeler who ran out on his date with Ginger, the grappling bear—and Neilson also saved his own skin when he fled from the ring when Ginger lost her muzzle during the scuffle.

Neilson tore right into the 400-pound animal at the outset of the bout but went through an uncomfortable two minutes and fifteen seconds as the furry grappler cuffed him around with ease. Twice Ginger had Stocky's shoulders to the mat but the hill-billy managed to squirm away.

Then during a scuffle, Ginger's muzzle dropped off and the "fun" started. Stocky leaped through the ropes and scampered up the aisle while spectators made an exodus from ringside seats.

It took Trainer Les Welch 10 minutes to finally persuade Ginger to leave the ring. He piled the bear with orange soda pop. Ginger downed four bottles with quick dispatch.

Welch made no effort to remuzzle Ginger and no one blamed him.

In the last bout of the evening, Pierre La Belle, handsome French-

Canadian, won over a meanie from Montana, Bob Cummings, in 23:22 of a 30-minute bout. Referee Al Saasz was credited with an assist in the scorebook.

Cummings spent the full bout aiming lousy boots at La Belle when he had the black-thatched Frenchman at a disadvantage. Saasz spent his time warning Cummings and La Belle spent his time getting angry. Next to the ropes, Saasz tried to break the two groaners and Cummings turned and belted the referee. Saasz retaliated with a neat right to Cummings' whiskers and La Belle wasn't caught with his holds down.

The Frenchman jumped on the Montanan and pinned him in short order. Cummings strenuously objected when La Belle's arm was raised in victory and resorted to indecent name-calling to lure La Belle back in the ring.

A furious scuffle followed with Cummings in the driver's seat and Saasz, in the excitement, raised Cummings' hand. The ref explained later that La Belle was the "official" winner because the match was billed for only one fall, but that Cummings was the winner of the extra-curricular grappling.

Polio Cancels Yale Grid Tilt

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 29 (AP)—Doctors kept the Yale football squad under close scrutiny today because one player has developed infantile paralysis. The Fordham game, scheduled for Saturday in the Yale bowl, has been cancelled.

Whether other games on the varsity schedule, particularly that against Columbia in New York next week from Saturday, would be called off remained uncertain. One university official, declining to permit use of his name, said that would depend on whether additional cases of polio develop among players exposed to the disease.

The university announced the cancellation of the Fordham game late yesterday. It was the first time since the bowl was opened in 1914 that a game had been called off. Athletic association officials estimated 18,000 tickets already had been sold for the contest, which would have marked the first appearance of a Fordham team in Connecticut.

No restrictions were placed on general student activities.

The stricken player, Richard D. Liechty, a 22-year-old back from Lake Geneva, Wis., is one of three Yale seniors to be afflicted by polio in recent days. The others are William C. Butler, of Winnetka, Ill., and Salvatore Miano, of New Britain, Conn.

The university described all three cases as "mild."

Then he grinned sheepishly and added in his mild, tenor voice:

"Every person is in baseball for what he can get out of it. I don't want to sound any different than anyone else. But honest, that's what I want. I know Slaughter and Musial feel the same way."

As of today, Robinson, cleanup hitter for the second place Dodgers, is leading with a batting average of .343 against 337 for Eino Slaughter and 336 for Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals. Robinson, after being in front most of the season, was overtaken last week by Slaughter, but he spurted ahead again.

"The batting championship is a nice honor to win," said Jackie, "but it is the team championship that counts. My wife wants me to win the batting championship. So I told her I would."

The chips are down now for the Negro second baseman and the Dodgers. The Cardinals are in front by one game with four to play. The Dodgers play two of these here with the Braves. The pressure is on, but Robinson said he did not feel it.
