## Stowaways Worry IGENOA

—Italian authorities are concerned over the increasing number of stowaways who want to seek their fortune in faroff lands.

Port officials reported recently that three Italian ships clandestinely returned a total of 36 such clandestine Italian emigrants, mostly from South America. Most of the stowaways are unemployed youths who try to go to Latin America. If they are not discovered aboard ship they are caught at the ports and returned.

Recently one ambitious youth made his way to Barcelona, Spain, in the hopes of making it easier to get aboard a South America-bound boat. He was caught by Spanish police and returned to Italy.

## Cattle Vaccination Ordered in Ethiopia

ADDIS ABABA (AP) — Emperor Haile Selassie by imperial decree has made vaccination compulsory in Ethiopia—for cattle.

The emperor took personal action after he learned that an estimated 1,000,000 head of Ethiopian cattle were dying annually because of rinderpest and pneumonia. Farmers who fail to obey will be fined.

## Mark's Value Cut Decided

BONN, Germany, Sept. 29 (AP) Chancellor Konrad Adenauer announced today that the three Western allies had decided to cut the value of the West German mark from 30 cents to 23.80 cents in U.S. money.

Adenauer, head of the new West German republic, said the allied recommendation had been given to his cabinet as a result of devaluation of the British pound.

Originally, Adenauer declared, the Germans had wanted the rate set at 22 1/2 cents.

## Fort Lewis Troops Go On Maneuvers

PORT LEWIS, Wash., Sept. 28 (AP) — Tail-end units of Fort Lewis troops were leaving this virtually deserted army post today to complete the first stages of a maneuver that will cover millions of square miles and involve more than 50,000 service men.

Nearly 15,000 2nd division troops reached San Diego yesterday and three more troopships will unload here during the rest of the week. Before they return to this and other Pacific Northwest posts, the men will have participated in an assault on the Hawaiian Islands.
