

# Irrigation Water Shut Off Today

Irrigation water in canals and ditches throughout the Klamath project, was shut off today by the bureau of reclamation.

Exact figures on the quantity of water which poured through the bureau's network of canals this season will be available in a few days, however this year's total will be well over 1948's, according to USBR Hydrographer R. S. Hopkins.

The fact that this year has been an extremely dry one is expected to be reflected in the total season's water use throughout the Klamath USBR project.

# Luckless Boy Seeks Arrest For Jail Home

A 16-year-old Medford boy who said he sought arrest to get something to eat and to place to sleep, is held in the county juvenile home for larceny of an automobile.

The automobile, taken from a parking place in front of the Cascade apartments, was owned by E. H. Kellogg, 1949 Del Moro. The boy said he drove the car to Dorris, abandoning it about 9 o'clock last night. He was arrested there and returned to Klamath county voluntarily.

During the ride he stopped at a service station at the Weed-Ashtland junction for gas and drove off without paying.

The boy said he had been "on his own" since 1947.

# Basin Survey Of Migrant Labor Made

Investigation into the possible need for migrant workers throughout the basin area is being conducted by a special committee appointed through the county Red Cross board of directors.

Cooperating with the Red Cross are the county welfare office and the Salvation Army.

County Agent C. A. Henderson said that if there are some harvest workers suffering hardships because of lack of work it is not because the harvest is late here, but because of early harvests elsewhere. Migrant workers, leaving other harvest areas, arrived too early to get the immediate benefit of working during the heavy season.

**October Pickup**

Henderson said that while the harvest has been slow this month compared with last September, it will get going in October at just about the same rate as in past years.

**Transient**

Appointed on the investigating committee were Rev. David Barnett, Otto Smith, Mrs. E. A. Geary, Alpha Urquhart, Capt. Al Longden and Katherine Geis.

The committee plans to visit harvest areas and talk to members of the community to determine if temporary assistance is required for laborers as yet unable to get work in the fields.

**Welfare Aid**

Should help be needed the county welfare department would be responsible for assisting families, the Red Cross for veterans and the Salvation Army for non-veteran single men.

Members of the Red Cross board discussed the problem of possible food and clothing needs of harvest hands at a regular meeting Thursday at the chamber of commerce.

Vice Chairman Clifford Shuck reported on conditions in the Merrill-Malin area. The board recommended that the home service committee of the Red Cross investigate the problem, and the latter committee named the group of six to visit the area.

Chairman Warren Bennet presided over the board meeting.

her is "backed by big national gambling syndicates."

I wouldn't doubt it. I think everybody will agree that the reason we have gambling (in spite of the fact that we have laws of all kinds forbidding gambling of any sort) is that GAMBLING IS BUSINESS.

It is very, very profitable business. So, in one way and another, the professional gamblers succeed in circumventing the law. Many people, in describing the situation, use rougher words than that. They say the gamblers CORRUPT the police. I don't like to say things I can't prove, and with my own eyes I never saw a gambler in the act of corrupting a policeman. So I have to use milder words. But I think I can say without overstatement that in Oregon the laws forbidding gambling are often disobeyed.

**AS for Mrs. Lee, I'm all for her.** I hope she succeeds in closing Portland up so tight that any professional gambler who tries to make a business even of pitching pennies at a crack for money will be clipped into jail before he has time to turn around.

The gambling situation that has existed in Oregon is a shame and a scandal everywhere. But in Oregon it is particularly deplorable, because it is corrupting a lot of good men in this state which is about the last stand in America of civic virtue and good citizenship.

If we are going to have laws against gambling, we ought to enforce them.

# 'Bogey' Wins Doll Fight With Girl!

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (AP)—Humphrey Bogart, the movie tough guy, was cleared today of bruising a pretty model because she tried to take his panda doll away from him.

Magistrate John R. Starkey dismissed an assault complaint brought by brunette Robin Roberts, 21, thus ringing down the curtain on the pre-dawn battle of El Morocco.

Starkey said there wasn't enough evidence to warrant a formal charge being placed against Bogart.

**Draws Crowd**

The rough-em-up movie star, specialist in tough-talking, hard-fighting roles, played to standing room only when he appeared to answer the curvaceous model's complaint.

Her story was that Bogart shoved her, causing her to fall down and bruise herself on the hip and elsewhere, when she playfully borrowed a 20-pound toy panda that Bogart had brought to the midtown night club.

# 3 Believed Dead in C-82 Night Crash

OLYMPIA, Sept. 30 (AP)—Three crewmen apparently perished when a C-82 "Flying Boxcar" crashed and burned in a heavily forested area 30 miles west of here last night.

Herb Grell, state forestry fire warden at Shelton, reported parts of bodies had been found scattered in the area.

**Bodies Broken**

They were so badly broken, he said, that he could not tell whether one or more bodies had been located.

Al Davis, another forest fire warden, reported to his office here that all three perished in the crash. He did not report whether the bodies had been recovered.

That, the jury decide, was sufficiently damaging to American morale to constitute treason. Her defense was based primarily on this contention.
