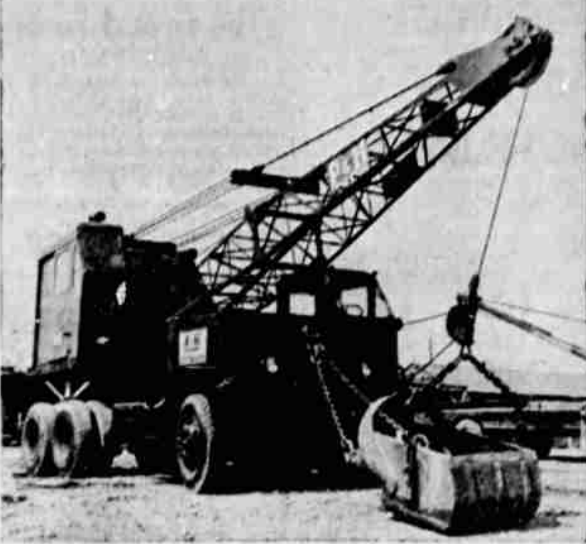
The last three meetings have been held at Oregon Tech, due to the facilities at hand.

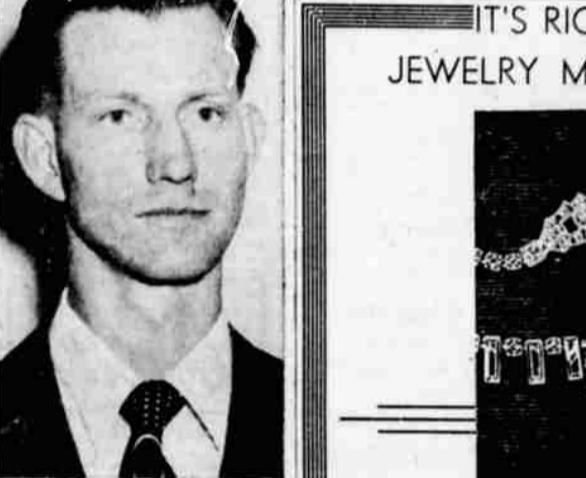

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 30 (AP)—Because a U. S. air force lieutenant tried to run over his wife with an automobile 10 days ago, he was given a six months suspended jail sentence yesterday and fined on three other charges.

Jack Lewis, of Denver, Colo., admitted to police that he attempted to run down his wife as they returned home after a party. They have since reconciled.

Lewis was fined \$50 and costs on a charge of dangerous driving, \$20 for illegal possession of liquor and \$20 for willful damage—the latter to a mailbox and window struck by the car.

ECA Stands For Lumber Aid Funds

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (AP)—The economic cooperation administration plans no change in its policy of insisting the United States lumber industry be afforded a chance to compete for business made possible with ECA dollars.

Paul Hoffman, administration head, so informed Rep. Mack (R-Wash.) today in reply to a request from the congressman.

Lumberman Concerned

Mack wrote Hoffman that Washington state lumber manufacturers and producers were concerned over an announcement by the state department that more latitude would be allowed the United Kingdom in purchases made with ECA dollars after the British devalued the pound.

Mack told Hoffman that any change in the previously announced policy to insist American producers be given a chance to bid on purchases made with ECA dollars would greatly harm the nation's lumber and plywood industry.

"There is no change contemplated in the policy whereby the United States lumber industry is afforded an opportunity to compete for lumber products where dollars are used to purchase the commodity," Hoffman replied.

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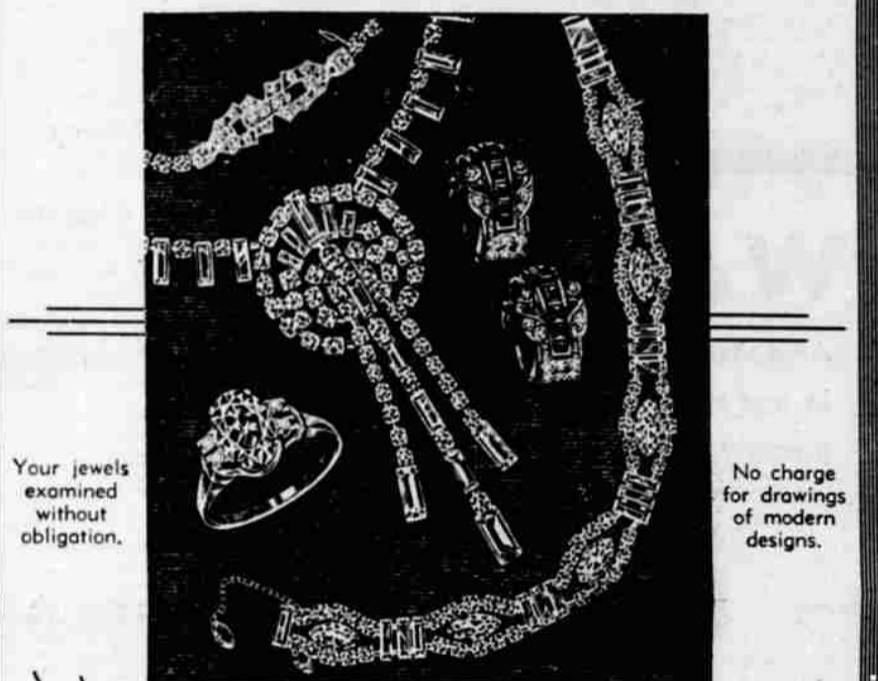
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
