

Brooks Grasp League Lead

Rain Keeps Yank, Sox Tie

The Brooklyn Dodgers held the upper hand in the National league's pennant scrap today, while the American league's scramble remained a dead heat between the Boston Red Sox and the New York Yankees.

Brooklyn, pre-season favorite to cop the National's hunting, roared into the lead yesterday by mopping up the 1948 kingpin Boston Braves, 9-2 and 8-0, while the St. Louis Cardinals lost again to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-2.

The Dodgers' killing in Boston boosted the Brooks half a game ahead of the Cardinals. Brooklyn has two games left to play with the third place Phils in Philadelphia while the Cards have three to go with the last place Cubs in Chicago.

While the Dodgers ascended to the top of the National league, rain kept the Red Sox and Yanks tied for blue ribbon honors in the American league.

New York's game with the Philadelphia Athletics in the stadium was rained out as was the encounter between the Red Sox and the last place Senators in Washington.

The two American league contenders are scheduled to play off their washed out games today. If rain again intervenes the games will be cancelled, as the Yanks and Red Sox are scheduled to open a two-game series in the stadium on Saturday.

Brooklyn had no trouble in whipping the Braves yesterday. The Braves were in the game for only three innings in the opener and they might as well have "stood in bed" for the nightcap.

Warren Spahn, the National's only 20-game winner, gave Preacher Roe, crafty Brooklyn lefthander, a run for his money for three innings in the first game.

SPAHN HIT
Tied, 0-0, going into the fourth, the Dodgers ripped Spahn for five runs. Duke Snider drove home the first three with his 23rd home run. Carl Furillo provided an anticlimax two innings later when he socked a three-run homer over the center field barrier. The 400-foot plus drive was Furillo's 15th out-of-field smash of the season.

The nightcap was settled before Sissy Sisti stepped up to open Boston's half of the first inning. The Dodgers whaled into Johnny Sain, Boston's 1948 pennant pin-up boy, in their half of the first, scoring five runs.

The game, played in a drizzle, was called after the fifth inning. Don Newcombe fanned the last three Boston batters.

Newcombe's victory was his 17th of the season. He held Boston hitless until the fourth when they nicked him for two safeties and followed up with two more blows in the fifth.

Little Murry Dickson, a once beloved member of the Cardinal pitching staff, spiked his former mates' pennant hopes.

Dickson hurled a brilliant six-hitter while the Pirates banged Gerry Staley, Howie Pollet and Ted Wilks for nine blows. It was Dickson's fifth triumph of the year over the Cards.

BREAK TIE
The Pirates broke a 1-1 tie with a four run rally in the sixth. Pete Castiglione singled home the first run to put the Pirates in front, 2-1, and Chase Staley. Pollet took over and was greeted with a two-run double by Monnie Bassall. Bassall scored the fourth run when Red Schoendienst threw the relay from the outfield over Catcher Joe Garagiola's head.

The Cleveland Indians trounced the Chicago White Sox, 8-3, in the only other game played in either league. Home runs by Larry Doby and Bob Kennedy were the deciding factors.

Donahoo is down with the flu and Van Lue is out with a badly-bruised right elbow.

Frank O'Neil, Grizzly coach, putting his ninth year in at Ashland, will field a team that was trounced by Coquille, 45 to 19, in the opener and came back last week to tame Redmond, 33 to 7.

Prime threat of the Ashland offense is said to be the passing arm of Quarterback Steve Laninovich and the plunging thrusts of Fullback Jerry Lanier.

Bob Hendershott will probably start Bob McPherson at quarterback, elusive Gaylor Huck at left half, driving Joe Nichols at right half and steady Joe Demetarakos at fullback.

The loss of Van Lue and Donahoo is expected to weaken the Pelican defense.

Dave Todd or Tom Quimowski may get the call at center while Dick Allen, Ed Zarosinski, Dick Dooge and John Elliott are four likely starters at Van Lue's wing post.

This is the first conference game for both teams. The Pels lost the curtain-raiser to a strong Grant team, 7 to 0, but came back last week to turn a Salem fumble into a victory by the same score.
