Oregon, UCLA Clash In Top Coast Game

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 30 (AP)—Ambitious Oregon and surprising UCLA meet tonight in what probably will be the most important Pacific Coast conference football game of the week-end.

Oregon, defending co-champion and unbeaten in conference combat for 14 games stretching back two seasons, comes south this year
