



Owls Face EOC Mountaineers

The Oregon Tech Owls are expected to run their victory string to two games — which would mark a record for the Owls in their second season — when they face a light tonight on Modoc Field. Kickoff time is slated for 8 o'clock.

Despite the probable loss of Tackle Don Gray and Guard Neil McLain, bunched with knee injuries suffered in the last week's Placer game, the Owls will field a forward wall averaging 194 from end to end.

This left, compared to only 174 for the Mountaineers, may take its toll before the four quarters of gridiron battle is over.

Starting backfield weigh in evenly, both the starting Owl and Mountaineer units averaging a light 168.

Mentor Dale Daugherty is expected to give opening backfield assignments to Jack Taylor at quarterback, who edged out Odie Eder on his Placer performance; Halfbacks Charles Warren and Vance Matott and Fullback Dean Weekly.

Lou DeLoretto, 143-pound EOC quarterback, was injured against Northern Idaho and may not start but advance notices have him in the field general spot.

Halfbacks are Harry Winston and Jim McAllister and Bob Terry, the heaviest at 188, will start at fullback.

If DeLoretto isn't in shape to open at the signal-calling position, the assignment may fall to Tub Warner, who has rejoined the squad after injuries. Pinsky Winters, defensive wingman, is also back after injuries have healed, although starting end jobs fall to Jerry Sherwood and Herman Lawson.

The EOC team, coached by Bob McQuinn, who has been at the La Grande school at the coaching helm for 21 years, uses a single wing

with an occasional T formation. Winston does the majority of the passing for the Mountaineers and shares fleet running duties with McAllister.

Terry is a pile-driving type of fullback, with plenty of weight to add emphasis.

The Mountaineer record this year is 8-2, a loss to Linfield, 49 to 6, and the short side of a 10-0 to 12 verdict to Northern Idaho college.

Daugherty will start John Paasch and Roy Dorfler at ends, Russ Johnson and Bob Humphrey at tackles, Ronald Deal and Frontis Smith, guards and big Dick Mill at center.

35 to 27 Bruins Pummel Oregon

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1 (AP)—The Bruins have reached a verdict. UCLA has got a football team.

They proved it last night in handily defeating, highly favored Oregon a 35-27 whacking. It put a severe crimp in the Rose Bowl hopes of the co-champions of the 1948 Pacific Coast conference campaign and was the Oregon's first conference setback in 14 games over a two-year period.

Next comes Stanford, and later on California and the vaunted Trojans of Southern California. Maybe the Bruins will hit a snag.

But they've already done more than expected, and so has their new head coach, accumulating 118 points in three games to 111 to the enemy's 65, the Bruins belted the Oregon unmercifully on the ground—316 yards to 38.

JOHNSON SHINES
Halfback Ernie Johnson was the individual star, accumulating 118 yards running and 56 by air, passing for one touchdown, scoring one himself and steering the Bruins to two more. Sharing honors would be the Bruin blockers, and Fullback Cliff Schroeder, End Bob Wilkinson and the remainder of the Sandersmen.

Woodley Lewis of Oregon uncorked a spectacular 93-yard kick-off return, sprinting straight down the center of the field. And Earl Stille, Coach Jim Aiken's quarterback replacement for the superb Norman Van Brocklin, kept his team always dangerous with an air attack that netted 136 yards to the Bruin 89.

UCLA got off to a 7-0 lead. The pesky Webfoots kept shooting at it but they never quite gained the advantage, and a final touchdown in the fourth quarter clinched the contest to the joy of most of the 43,137 rooters. UCLA held a half-time lead of 21-13.

ZANY SCORES
Two Oregon touchdowns in the third quarter would be hard to duplicate. The first was set up on the five-yard line by a deflected Oregon pass that bounced into a surprised Webfoot receiver. Soon after, another deflection landed in the welcome arms of Darrell Robinson. Webfoot end, who stepped a few yards to the six points.

The UCLA ground attack, centered on Oregon's ends and tackles, plus tremendous blocking, spelled the difference.

Red Sox, Yankees Collide

This could be the day of decision in the major league pennant races. The Boston Red Sox can clinch the American league flag by knocking off their challengers, the New York Yankees, today at Yankee stadium.

If they miss, they still have a chance on the last day tomorrow since a Yankee victory today would throw the race into another tie.

Over in the National, a combination of a Brooklyn victory and a St. Louis Cardinal defeat could win the championship for the Dodgers, who now lead by one game.

The Dodgers play the Phillies in Philadelphia while the Cards, with three straight defeats haunting them, take on the tall-end Cubs in Chicago.

A loss for the Dodgers in one of the remaining two games and a sudden come-to-life for the Cards could force the National race into a best-of-three playoff.

The New York, A's polished off the Yankees, 4-1, while the last place Cubs throtted the Cards, 6-5. The Red Sox helped themselves by drubbing the Washington Senators, 11-9, while the Dodgers had an open date.

Boxer Manager McCarthy is leaving nothing to chance. He's tossing Mel Parnell, his 25-game winner, against the Yanks today.

The harassed Casey Stengel, in his most desperate spot of the season, will send his top winner, Alie Reynolds, to the mound for the Yankees. Joe DiMaggio will rejoin the team and may play.

BRECHEN TO HURL
In the National league race, the Cards realize that the final outcome will hinge on the performance of the pitcher, Harry Brechen, 14-game winner, will take the hill for the Cards against Bob Chipman.

Barney Shotton has named Ralph Branca, the big righthander to work today's game in Shibe park for the Dodgers.

The Brooks will have no easy path, though, for the Phils will be represented on the rubber by Ken Heintzelman, who has a 5-6 record against the flabbers.

Yesterday's doings in Washington amazed nearly everyone. The Sox certainly scored their runs the easy way. They collected exactly five hits off the combined offerings of five Washington pitchers.

The Senators counted 18 hits including five doubles.

FOWLER STINGY
The turn of events at the Yankee stadium was on the sane side. The Yanks simply couldn't hit Dick Fowler, whom they sent to the showers in three innings in the opening game of the A's cause.

Aiding and abetting the A's cause were Sam Chapman and Ferris Fain who clouted home runs. They meant everything for Fain's came with two on. Both were off Ed Lopez, Yank starter.

The skidding Cards also helped beat themselves, as has often been the case of late. Stan Musial lost a fly ball off the bat of Roy Smalley in the sun, and it fell for a double. That set the stage for two Cub runs in the third and it made the difference.

Ralph Kiner hit his 54th home run of the season to help the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. Kiner needs two more home runs to the Hack Wilson's National league record of 36, set in 1930.

In the only other game of the day, the Cleveland Indians, behind Bob Feller, moved into a third place tie with Detroit in the American league by dumping the Tigers, 6-4.
