

# O'Mahoney Pushes Mine Aid Bill

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—**The administration may have unwittingly given a push to badly stymied mine aid legislation.

To support President Truman's program for aid to underdeveloped European countries, the senate banking committee has approved a bill guaranteeing European investments against confiscation and assuring conversion of receipts into U.S. currency.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) said the measure "surely" would provide ammunition for his effort to get action on his bill to provide federal aid for exploration, development and conservation of domestic base metal mines.

It is estimated more than 2000 mines, mostly in Western states, would be eligible.

The Wyoming senator has notified the senate he will attempt to bring his bill up for consideration "at an opportune time."

**Argument**  
 The argument will be used that, if the government can afford to help investors in their undertakings abroad, it also can afford to prop up the staggering metal mining industry at home.

Senator Millikin (R-Colo.) is of the same opinion.

He said he was opposed to government participation in the foreign investment program "as a whole," and certainly the government should support domestic investments as against any program to underwrite foreign undertakings.

**Mining Backlog**  
 For the past few years, members from Western states have been trying to get some legislation worked out which would keep the metal mining industry in a position to produce when the metals are needed.

The mining industry, itself, has been divided on methods and the administration has objected to a subsidy for production, even though many small mines have been unable to operate at market prices.

The administration also objects to any allowance for profit on operations of subsidized mines.

O'Mahoney's bill would authorize financial aid for exploration and development of promising ore bodies. The government could bear a share of the cost of maintaining an idle property.

There would be no production subsidy but a market would be provided for the production of mines helped by the government program.

The bill is on the senate calendar, ready for action when its sponsor thinks the time is favorable.

**Chilly Maneuvers In October**

## Vet's Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper will publish an occasional column of news items from the veterans administration. For further information veterans should contact or write their nearest VA office.

The Veterans administration has announced the proposed dividend scale by which it will divide up a special \$2,800,000,000 national service life insurance dividend among some sixteen million World War II veterans.

Maximum possible amount that any veteran can receive will be \$528. The dividend will be paid on both term and converted insurance policies, and will be paid only for the period that the policy was in force prior to the policy anniversary in 1948. No payments will be made for periods of lapse.

The VA said the estimated rate of the dividend was arrived at after long actuarial studies, and that the rate of payment will be the same for both term and converted policies.

In computing the maximum payment of \$528, the dividend was based on a \$10,000 policy in force for 96 months (the longest possible period), on a veteran aged 40 or less at the time the policy was taken out. This represents a payment of 55 cents a month per \$1000 of insurance. As the mortality rate for the age group of 40 and under did not vary greatly, a single dividend rate will apply to this whole group.

The rates of payment will be: Those under 40 years of age at the rate of 55 cents per month per \$1000 of insurance; those 41 to 45 years of age, scaling down to 37 cents to 40 cents; those 46 to 50, 37 cents down to 25 cents; those 51 to 54,

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# GOP Seeks Registration Rolls Purge

**PORTLAND, Oct. 3 (AP)—**A clean up of voter registration rolls was suggested before the republican state central committee at a meeting here yesterday.

Leslie Ross, Deschutes county chairman, charged that at the last general election the post office had returned 3000 voters' pamphlets because they were non-deliverable. He said in his county the rolls in their present condition list 9000 voters, and give the false impression that the democrats still hold their pre-war lead.

Ross called for action forcing the Deschutes county clerk to purge the rolls in accordance with state law. The law requires the county clerks to drop from the rolls all persons who have not voted in the past two general elections.

**Better Press**  
 Hood River County Chairman John Mohr and Committeewoman Mrs. Borchard von Lubkin demanded better press relations for the party. They said the democratic legislators had the best of it with reporters in the past session.

State Chairman Siskir B. Unander, Portland, reported all 36 Oregon counties have active republican organizations, but he said precinct organizations must now be improved. He set committeemen in all 3718 precincts as the party's next goal.

In a Saturday session, Governor McKay and Secretary of State Newbury spoke briefly.
