

State Meet Eyes Taxes, Fiscal Setup

PORTLAND, Oct. 5 (AP)—Taxes continued to be a major topic today before the council of state government's western regional conference. Fiscal policies were also up for review.

Delegates were told yesterday by Frank W. Bane, Chicago, the council's executive secretary, that federal taxes on gasoline should be earmarked for highways. He said the fund totals near \$500,000,000 annually. He suggested the federal government set the money aside for road work or drop the levy and permit the states to tap the revenue source.

Oregon Legislator Paul L. Patterson urged the formation of a western group to advise one another on fiscal policies, particularly as they relate to highway regulations. Ralph T. Moore reported Oregon had learned it was false economy to delay road improvements. Oregon had done so for years, he said, and now realizes the projects are more expensive than annual maintenance.

First Shipment Made on Order

Klamath Packing company, which submitted a successful bid for 35,000 pounds of cured and fresh meats to the Oregon state purchasing board, made its first shipment north Tuesday in a refrigerated truck.

Frank Lowell, head of Klamath Pack, said the first shipment totaled 1500 pounds of fresh meat and some 2500 pounds of cured. Shipments will be made daily during the month of October. The submitted bid was for this month.

Various state institutions at Salem, Corvallis, Woodburn and elsewhere will receive the meat.

Writing, No Reading

Woman Publisher Puts Out Paper in Her Spare Time

Jane Walker, managing editor and entire staff of the Hendry County News at LaBelle, does a lot of writing but refuses to read her material in the newspapers.

She doesn't trust printers; hates typographical errors in her copy; and so she doesn't have to worry if she doesn't see mistakes, if any. Mrs. Walker is correspondent for the Fort Myers News-Press, but doesn't read her writings in that, either. Her copy is typed in blue on pink paper.

She works from 7:30 until at least 3:30 daily writing, answering the phone, soliciting ads and doing the myriad of other things to meet the weekly deadline.

Her office is a dilapidated one-room building with newspapers taped up at windows. Dismantled machinery fills the back of the room, for the News is now printed in nearby Moore Haven where the proof-reading also is done.

Biggest headache is advertising. One year ads got switched at Christmas time and came out with a LaBelle merchant offering dignified greetings while the sheriff's ad thanked customers for patronage during the year.

Mrs. Walker's father was an employee of the Louisville, Ky., Courier-Journal. She is a native of Atlanta, Ga.

Coos Bay Channel Bids Opened

PORTLAND, Oct. 5 (AP)—The army engineers have opened bids on the additional 10½ miles of maritime channel that has long been a goal of Coos bay shipping interests.

A low bid of \$870,611 by Pacific Dredging company, Paramount, Calif., yesterday was \$51,515 below the engineers' estimate.

The project calls for a channel 30 feet deep and 300 feet wide, an anchorage basin 2000 by 600 feet about two miles north of Empire and two turning basins off North Bend and Coos Bay City.

Herringshaw and Thompson each bagged a big black bear.

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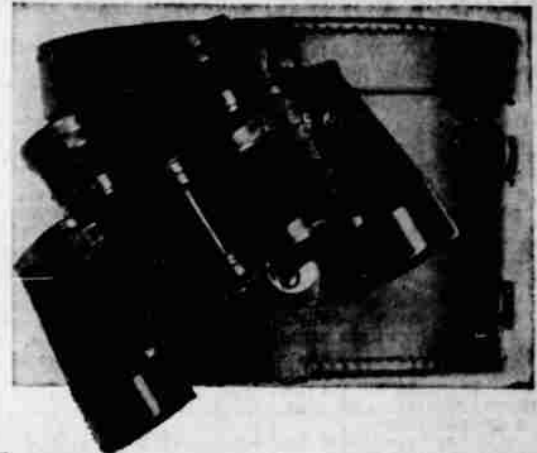


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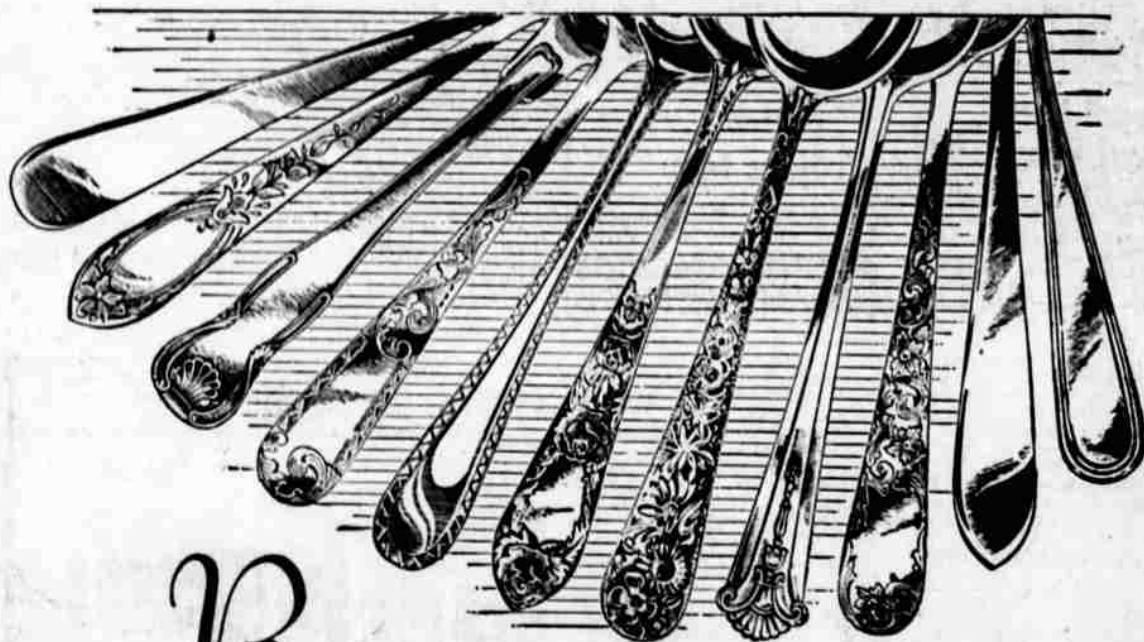
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
