He was closely pressed for national honors in this week's poll by two guards, Iowa's Earl Banks was outstanding against Purdue and Southern Methodist's Jack Haliday did a bang-up job against Missouri.

**PIERRE PUNISHED**

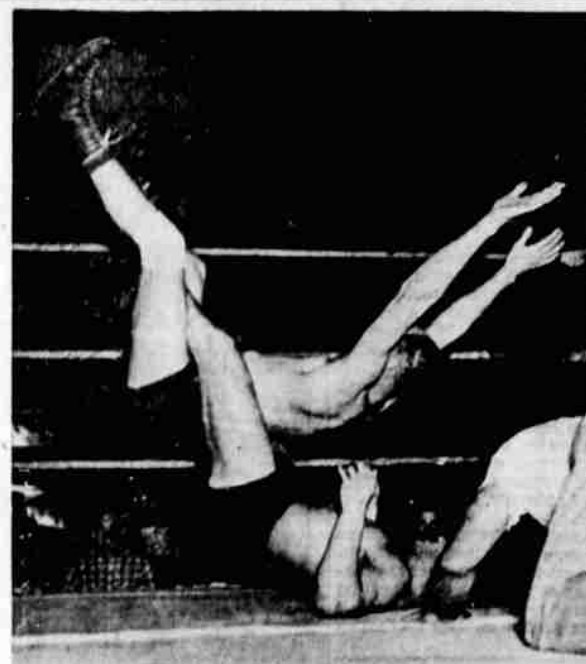

The committee's rejection of the full coordinated program was described by Senator Cain (R-Wash) as "a sacrifice by the administration on the altar of a valley authority."

President Truman has recommended to congress the creation of a Columbia valley administration to develop that Pacific Northwest basin.

## Whitlock Case Continued

**YREKA**—Arraignment of Earl Whitlock, former Klamath Falls mortician on a charge of drunken driving involving an injury accident, will be continued in Siskiyou County superior court to November 7.

Arraignment proceedings, which started here September 19 when Judge James M. Allen denied a defense motion to have the informa-

tion set aside, was to have been concluded with entering of Whitlock's plea October 3, but the jurist was home ill.

There is a petition for a writ of prohibition pending in the third district court of appeals at this time, the writ filed for the purpose of setting aside an information. The point made by the defense is that in the preliminary hearing, the transcript does not show cause for action against Whitlock.
