

Art Exhibit Shows Child Training Aim

Two interesting exhibits were opened this morning at the Art Center, 1127 Main.

Numerous lithographs of water colors and pencil drawings done by children from the ages of three to 15 years who studied in the Cizek school, in Vienna compose one display.

Franz Cizek, an artist himself, devoted his life to the study of children's art. He advocated respect of the child's own emotional and mental world, his creative capacities and individuality.

This method of teaching was at first met with great opposition, since the system of art teaching practiced before Cizek opened his juvenile art classes in 1897 stressed that a child learn to copy correctly.

Now, a few years after Professor Cizek's death, the object of the juvenile art classes he started is still to give children the opportunity of creative activity which would lead to appreciation of art.

The second group of paintings on display is the work of Earl Stroh, an instructor at the University of Bolivia. The 3-year-old artist has studios in New York, Tass, N.M., and Bolivia.

Stroh has included in this collection, oils, watercolors, pen and ink drawings, and others showing his skill with crayon and chalk.

The two exhibits opened this morning, and are open daily from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. Special showings will also be featured tonight and tomorrow evening from 8 until 10 o'clock, and Sunday 2 to 4 p.m.

FOURTH INNING DODGERS

Robinson fouled off an attempted bunt, then was struck out swinging on four pitches. Hermanski was credited with a three-bagger when his slice hit to right center skipped by DiMaggio who fell as he was about to retrieve the ball on one bounce. Right-fielder Bauer finally fielded the ball which had rolled to the bullpen, 400 feet away. Backley tapped to second base and Coleman nailed Hermanski at the plate with a splendid underhand toss to Silvera. Backley was safe at first on the fielder's choice. Hodges flied to Bauer in right-center.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

FOURTH INNING YANKEES

Bauer punched a Texas league single into short center but was out at second when he attempted to stretch it. Snider to Reese who made the tag. Reese trotted over to the Dodger dugout and after some discussion with Manager Ben Shotton, Luis Olmo was sent out to left field to replace Backley. DiMaggio fouled off two pitches, then went down swinging on a low inside curve for Roe's strikeout. Roe knocked down Lindell's liner back to the box and threw him out at first. The pitcher was examining his right hand as he walked off the mound.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

FIFTH INNING DODGERS

Jack Banta, a righthander, began warming up in the Dodger bullpen. Campanella rapped a single through the hole between third and short, but was out trying for second as Lindell, after hobbling the ball, fired into Coleman who made the tag on the sliding Campanella. Roe was called out on strikes. Reese worked the count to 2-2, then sent a sharp grounder to Johnson who threw him out.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

FIFTH INNING YANKEES

It was officially announced that Backley had suffered a pulled muscle in his back on Bauer's opening single in the fourth inning. Johnson swung at Roe's first pitch and raised a short pop foul to Campanella who caught it to the left of the plate. Coleman drove a double inside the third base line, the ball bouncing off the barrier in left field.

Reese raced behind Jorgensen to make a fine stop of Silvera's grounder and threw him out with a long accurate throw. Coleman going to third on the play. Raschi went out on a slow roller to Jorgensen.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

SIXTH INNING YANKEES

Rizzuto grounded to Hodges who beat him to first for the putout. Hodges reached up for Henrich's high hopper and flipped to Roe who covered first for the out. Jorgensen scooped up Bauer's sizzling grounder and threw to Hodges for the out.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

SIXTH INNING DODGERS

Jorgensen's high lazy fly dropped inside the left field foul line for a double with both Lindell and Rizzuto making a game but futile try to catch the ball. DiMaggio loped in for Snider's high pop fly in short center. Jorgensen holding second. Robinson bounced out. Rizzuto to Henrich, with Jorgensen going to third. Hermanski grounded to Henrich who picked up the ball with one foot on the bag for the unassisted putout.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

SEVENTH INNING DODGERS

Olmo singled to right as Bauer had a little difficulty starting for the ball. The field was still wet from yesterday's early rain, this accounting for the slow footing. Hodges grounded to Rizzuto who started a double play, the short-stop to Coleman to Henrich. It was a very close decision at first. Campanella flied to Lindell deep in left-center.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

SEVENTH INNING YANKEES

DiMaggio looked at a ball, fouled off the next pitch, then grounded out. Jorgensen to Hodges. Lindell flied straight-away to Olmo in left. Johnson's low line drive dropped at the feet of Olmo for a single. Johnson was credited with a stolen base, sliding in ahead of Campanella's throw to Reese who was late covering second. There apparently was a mixup as to whether he or Robinson should cover the bag. Coleman rolled out. Robinson to Hodges.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

EIGHTH INNING DODGERS

Roe was given a rousing ovation as he came up to bat. Roe went down swinging, striking out for the third straight time. Rizzuto made a nice stop of Reese's sharp grounder to his right and threw him out. Jorgensen lined right into the hands of Coleman.

EIGHTH INNING YANKEES

Rizzuto laid down a sacrifice bunt between third and the mound, and was safe when Roe, in his haste to pick up the ball, fumbled for an error. It was ruled a sacrifice and an error. Stirnweiss stopped at second on the play. The first two pitches to Henrich were balls. Tom then swung and missed the next pitch and fouled off the fourth. And fifth—and sixth pitches—wound the count to 3-2, and then flied to Olmo, the runners holding their bases. Bauer hit a 3-1 pitch on two bounces to Jorgensen who whipped to Robinson forcing Rizzuto at second.

NINTH INNING DODGERS

Robinson laid down a sacrifice bunt inside the first base line and was out. Henrich to Coleman who covered first. Carl Furillo, a righthander, batted for Hermanski. Furillo popped Page's second pitch to Coleman who made the catch on the grass in very short right. Olmo was an easy out. Rizzuto to Henrich.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

NINTH INNING YANKEES

Mike McCormick went to right field for the Dodgers. With the count of two strikes and no balls, DiMaggio lapped a slow roller between third and the mound and beat Jorgensen's throw for an infield single for his first hit of the series. Lindell fouled off an attempted bunt, then went down swinging, missing a low pitch that almost hit the dirt. Johnson fouled off two pitches, then raised a high pop to Robinson who made the catch a few feet inside first base. Coleman flied to McCormick who made the catch in short center.
