PORTLAND, Oct. 6 (AP)—The lumber industry has perked up favorably in the past few weeks according to trade reports from

Washington and Oregon mill points. The West Coast Lumbermen's association reported orders for Douglas fir in the last week of September totaled 108,547,000 board feet. This was compared with 80,554,000 the same week a year ago. Orders have been running 10 to 25 per cent ahead

of production for the last few weeks. The association said both production and shipments were ahead of a year ago.
