### Copco Gross Revenues Up

MEDFORD — According to a statement issued today by A. B. Cummins, president of the California Oregon Power company reports gross operating revenues for the 12 months ending September 30, 1949, of \$9,769,317 as compared with revenues of \$8,529,565 for the same period ending September 1948.

Gross operating revenues for the nine months ending September 30, 1949 were \$7,267,558 as compared with revenues of \$6,452,438 for the corresponding period ending September 1948, an increase of \$815,120 or 12.63 per cent.

Gross operating revenues for the month of September 1949 amounted to \$83,606, an increase of \$90,108 or 12.02 per cent over those of September 1948.

Salé of electricity to residential customers during the 12 months ending September 30, 1949, increased 27.27 per cent over those of the previous periods, and average 4548.87 kilowatt-hours per customer, at an average cost of 1.612 cents per kilowatt-hour.

Louis Hallock, veteran of 13 years service with national parks, has taken over the post of chief ranger of Crater Lake national park. Ranger Hallock replaces Chief Ranger Clyde Gilbert, resigned. Mr. and Mrs. Hallock are residing in the park and their daughter is in school at Chico State college.

### Premier Quits French Post

PARIS, Oct. 6 (AP)—President Vincent Auriol accepted today the resignation of Premier Henri Queuille, and the extreme right and left immediately began clamoring for a respite to power.

Queuille offered his resignation yesterday after a bitter cabinet deadlock on the wage-price issue, and Auriol was unable to persuade the radical socialist (conservative) leader to reconsume.

It was the fifth time since the creation of the postwar fourth French republic that Auriol has accepted a premier's resignation.
