

Early Fund Collections Point To Colorful Yuletide Streets

Christmas decorations for downtown Klamath Falls are apparently assured, according to a report made to the chamber of commerce directors at noon Wednesday by Al Lent, of the Merchants association. Approximately two thirds of the sum headed had been raised, he said, and it is expected that the remainder of the amount will be in hand by some time next week. Considerable economies have been effected by the committee that has the project in charge, he reported.

For example, at least \$1000 will be saved by having the electrical wiring done here instead of by the contractors who are providing the decorations.

Christmas Tree
The 20-30 club, he said, has agreed to take over the downtown Christmas tree that will be a part of the street decoration program.

Further developments in the problem of mail and express service posed by the cancellation of two California trains by the Southern Pacific were given in a report from the Los Angeles chamber of commerce which protested the removal of the trains, but agreed not to bring the formal proceedings before the California public utilities commission for a period of six months during which the railroad company has agreed to review the situation and take remedial measures in case the loss of service proves to be a serious handicap to the California and Oregon communities that are affected.

Outgoing Service Hit
George P. Davis pointed out to the directors that incoming mail and express service has not been seriously curtailed by reduction in the number of trains. It is the outgoing service, he explained, that has been most interfered with.

Manager Charles Stark read a letter from the Three Flags highway association containing the information that the three-mile section just north of Secret Valley that has been rough and difficult has been resurfaced and is now open to traffic and that surfacing contracts for 10 miles in the John Day section of the highway in northern Oregon are soon to be let.

Interesting Talk
An interesting feature of the noon program was a brief talk by Russell S. Rhodes, manager of the Tulsa, Okla. chamber of commerce, who is making a tour of cities in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. He predicted that all areas in the West and the Southwest will continue to grow as a result of a steady drift of population and industry from the East and the Northeast. He discussed problems of chamber of commerce organization and asserted that keeping the membership fully informed as to what is being done stands at the top of the list.

Manager Stark, telling of complaints that have followed the operations of an outside crew of magazine salesmen within the past few days, urged again that wherever possible people give preference to local concerns, which are here on the ground, year in and year out, and to whom complaints of poor service can be taken.

NP Tree Farming Group Formed

Import Curb On Canadian Timber, Aim

SEATTLE, Oct. 6 (AP)—Enough Canadian logs were brought into Washington state last year to have given every logger in Whatcom and Skagit counties full-time employment, a resolution adopted by the Seattle CIO council last night said.

The council's resolution urged that an import quota be placed on Canadian logs to maintain American forest industry employment at levels above 88 per cent. Thousands of U. S. loggers have been thrown out of work during the last two years, the resolution charged, with the result that Washington state has paid out \$6,650,642 in unemployment compensation to idle loggers.

In making the Whatcom-Skagit counties comparison, the council said it was in those counties that unemployment is heaviest.

Dam Contracts Next Month

SEATTLE, Oct. 6 —Initial contracts for work at Chief Joseph dam on the Columbia will be let next month, the district army engineers office said yesterday. Others will be let as rapidly as work progresses.

Alaska Closer Via New Road

SEATTLE, Oct. 6 (AP)—Fairbanks, Alaska, will be 500 miles closer to Seattle next summer by automobile. Completion of the John Hart highway — from Vancouver, B. C., to Dawson Creek, the Alaska military highway bridgehead — will cut that many miles from the trip by eliminating the long jaunt from Seattle to Edmonton, Alta.

The highway, named for the former British Columbia premier, runs from Vancouver through Chilliwack, Clinton, Williams Lake and Prince George to Dawson Creek. It already is passable except for 24 miles.

POTATO PARKER HOUSE ROLLS

In a metal saucepan (2 quart size) bring rapidly just to a boil — 1/2 cup milk

Take from heat and add —

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup unseasoned, mashed white potato

Stir mixture until well blended. Then add, in order —

- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1 cake moist compressed yeast, crumbled

Stir until yeast disappears. Then add 1/2 of —

- 2 1/2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour

Beat thoroughly to form a thick, smooth batter. Add remaining flour and mix into a moderately stiff dough. Turn out on floured board and knead lightly about 30 seconds (about 50 strokes) forming dough into a smooth ball. Cover with damp cloth and allow to rest 15 minutes. Roll dough into an oblong about 18 x 6 inches. Spread entire surface of dough with —

- 2 tablespoons melted butter

Place on greased baking sheet about 2 inches apart, pressing both ends of sticks firmly and flatly to the pan.

Cover with damp cloth and let rise in warm place until light and double in bulk, about 40-45 minutes. Brush with melted butter. Bake in a hot oven, 400°, for 10-12 minutes. While still warm, spread tops of baked sticks with icing made by mixing 1/4 cups sifted powdered sugar with 1 tablespoon table cream. 1 1/2 dozen sticks.

SOUR CREAM CINNAMON STICKS

Take from heat and add —
