DUNSMUIR — Funeral services for Carl J. Summers, 58, Southern Pacific locomotive engineer, who perished in his home here Friday when it was gutted by fire, were held Monday in the Dunsmuir Methodist church under the direction of Noble's Chapel Rev. T. Elmer Smith officiated. Interment was in the Dunsmuir cemetery. Pallbearers were Gordon Hawkins, Richard Coe, J. J. Loney, E. H. Patton, Rex McMillan, and Raymond Pinneran.

Summers began work here as a fireman in April of 1910. He was promoted to engineer in August 1919. A native of Missouri, he is survived by his wife, Ann, and a sister, Mrs. June King of Houston, Tex., a former Dunsmuir resident.

'Gold Rush' Train Rips Money Bag

LITCHFIELD PARK, Ariz., Oct. 6 (AP)—An unscheduled "gold rush" started and ended abruptly here yesterday.

Currency in 1, 5, 10, and 20-dollar denominations was scattered over an eight-mile stretch of railroad right-of-way.

ANGEL FOOD CAKE

1 1/2 cups egg whites
1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1 tsp. flavoring

1 cup sifted SOFTASILK
Cake Flour
or GOLD MEDAL "Kitchen-tested" Flour

METHOD

Beat egg whites with flat whip until frothy. Then beat in cream of tartar and salt. Continue beating until egg whites are glossy, fine-grained and will stand up in a stiff point.

Add 1 cup of the sugar gradually, gently beating and folding after each addition. Fold in the flavoring.

Sift flour and remaining 1/2 cup sugar together 3 times. Sprinkle a couple tablespoons of this flour-sugar mixture at a time over the egg white and sugar mixture. Then gently and carefully fold it in. Continue until all the flour-sugar mixture is folded in.

Pour into a dry ungreased deep 9 or 10-inch tube center pan. Cut through the batter with a knife. Bake 60 to 65 minutes in a slow moderate oven (325°).

When cake is done, remove from oven and invert pan immediately... letting cake hang in pan until entirely cold.
