

Stocks Down Early, Level

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—The stock market leveled off late today after a slow early decline.

Automobile issues made a substantial comeback, most of them showing small gains. About the best that could be said for other groups was that losses were shaded. Turnover was substantial and at

a rate of around 1,200,000 shares for the full day.

Today's setback, small though it was, interrupted a four-day winning streak which lifted the general price level to a peak for the year.

Graham-Paige, popular yesterday, moved up again. Also up were Willys-Overland, General Motors, Chrysler, Studebaker, Packard, and Commonwealth Edison.

Allied chemical dropped around 3 points at one time. Smaller declines were posted for Youngstown Sheet, Goodrich, Douglas Aircraft, Kennecott Copper, International

Paper, Standard Oil (NJ), and Texas Co.
