ADAM AND EVE

EDITORS' NOTE: This is the second in a series of studies from the Old Testament. The text is condensed from selections by Houston Hartly for the new book "In Our Image." Illustrations by Guy Rowe are from the book.

AND the Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden; and there he put the man whom he had formed. And out of the ground made the Lord to grow every tree that is good for food; the tree of life also, and the tree of knowledge of good and evil. And the Lord commanded the man saying, The tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die. And they were both naked, the man and his wife, and were not ashamed.

NOW the serpent was more subtle than any beast which the Lord had made. And he said unto the woman, Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden? And the woman said unto the serpent, Of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, lest ye die. And the serpent said, Ye shall not surely die: for God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil. And the woman took of the fruit, and did eat, and gave also unto her husband, and the eyes of them both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together, and made themselves aprons; and they hid themselves from the Lord among the trees of the garden.

AND the Lord called unto Adam, and said, Where art thou? And he said, I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself. And he said, Who told thee that thou wast naked? Hast thou eaten of the tree, whereof I commanded thee that thou shouldest not eat? And the man said, The woman gave me of the tree, and I did eat. And the Lord said unto the woman, What is this that thou hast done? And the woman said, The serpent beguiled me, and I did eat. And the Lord said unto the serpent, Because thou hast done this, thou art cursed above every beast, and I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel. Unto the woman he said, In sorrow shalt thou bring forth children; and thy desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee. And unto Adam he said, Because thou hast eaten of the tree, of which I commanded thee, saying, Thou shalt not eat of it: cursed is the ground for thy sake; in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, till thou return to the ground; for out of it was thou taken: for dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return. AND the Lord God sent him forth from the garden of Eden, to till the ground from whence he was taken. And he placed at the east of the garden Cherubims, and a flaming sword which turned every way, to keep the way of the tree of life.

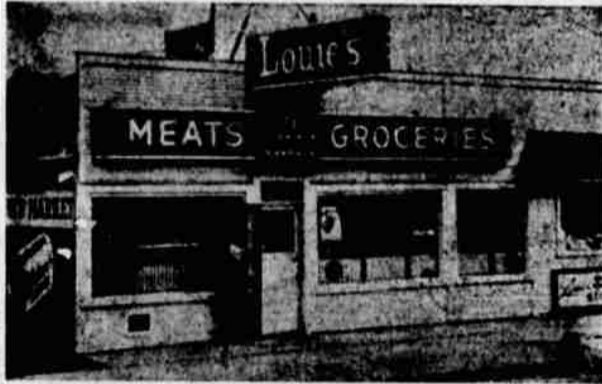
Sunday school classes meet at 9:45, and those who do not have a church home are invited to come and bring their children.
