By the HIGNS in the sky—the orderly and legitimate astronomical signs and not those connected with superstitions—proclaim definitely that summer is past and autumn is well on the way.

When an extended period of good weather prevails, October brings us the dreamy season of Indian summer with days of pleasant warmth and hazy horizons.

The planets Mercury, Saturn and Mars—upward in the order named—now lie in a long straight line in the eastern sky at dawn.

Let us locate the bright stars of the evening sky at around 8 p. m. The most brilliant of the planets, Venus, is in the southwest and Jupiter in the south.

Note the familiar Big Dipper, low and right side up, and somewhat west of north.

Proclamation of the Eastern German republic under Russian domination, is a strategic move by Moscow aimed at winning over the British-French-American zones of Germany with Bonn as capital.

The Soviet union this is intensifying its drive for a unified Germany which can be brought under control of Moscow.

The establishment of this Eastern republic doesn't materially alter the status of that part of Germany as a Soviet satellite.

What has been done by setting up the republic is to create a symbol of nationalism which the Muscovites hope will prove attractive to Western Germany and bring about a union.

Oregon CIO Takes Poke At Bridges

BEND, Ore., Oct. 8 (AP)—Longshoremen support from the Oregon CIO convention here yesterday, but delegates figuratively turned their backs on HARRY BRIDGES, the longshore leader.

They rejected a resolution calling for the federal government to withdraw its perjury charges against BRIDGES. Thus they followed the recommendation of the state CIO executive board.

Portland longshoremen, who opposed the resolution, argued that the perjury charge was part of an attempt to weaken their union.

Opponents, rebelling against what they called "left-wingers," fellow travelers, agents of a foreign nation" denied that the case had any effect on the longshore rank-and-file.

They then complimented the longshoremen for their "militant conduct" of the Hawaiian dock strike, and called it a "noble victory."

There was brief mention of the barge load of "hot cargo" pineapple at the Dalles, but no indication as to whether longshoremen would be willing to allow unloading now that the Hawaiian strike virtually is settled.

The barge was brought over during the Hawaii strike, and was picketed by longshoremen. The owners were unable to unload. Previously longshoremen indicated the barge would have to return to Hawaii before they would consider unloading it.

AFL Launches Raid on CIO

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 8 (AP)—The AFL today embarked on a plan to carve huge membership chunks from the CIO toward achieving a figured 1,000,000-member gain in 1950.

Key officials of the American Federation of Labor said privately they expect to pick up big parts of CIO unions, when the factional scrap in the CIO comes to a head, as may happen soon.

A showdown between the CIO's left wing and the right wing elements is shaping up for the CIO convention at Cleveland later this month. CIO President Phillip Murray has threatened his left wing union leaders with expulsion.

But words cannot express what one feels at learning of such a tragedy.

The ways of life are devious, and oftentimes cruel.

We cannot hope to understand the ways of Providence, except to say that it is God's will.

The least we can do, though is to say a silent prayer for the young couple who were so abruptly robbed of the few happy hours they had together.

Still the world goes on. What was it Shakespeare said in Macbeth? "Life is but a stage, and we the players on it."

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—John W. Price is the only fireman in America who has had a crab, a snail, and a flatworm named in his honor.

For 72 hours a week Price operates a switchboard at the Lancaster fire department.

But that is only his life. His real life is in the world of nature. In his self-taught authority on invertebrate paleontology—the study of fossil creatures without backbones.

It took a lot of backbone on however, to aspire to be an expert in such a field.

"It isn't exactly overworked," he smiled, "but it does require a certain degree of honor."

Today, however, he ran up "D.S.C." after his name. Tom, Frank and Marshall college has granted him an honorary degree—doctor of science.

"It was the proudest moment of my life," he said. "I won't say I didn't dream of it. But I didn't dare hope it would come so soon."
