In 1936 she returned to Europe and continued her studies in Dresden, Rome and Vienna, and in 1948 she returned to the United States to be joined later by her husband and two small daughters.

Mr. and Mrs. Taucher, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Truman Lynch of Tulelake, will dance the Yugoslavian schottische, waltz and clapping dance.

Through the courtesy of the Art Center there will be a display of arts and handicrafts arranged by Mrs. U. S. Balestino. Also an exhibit will be a personal collection of souvenirs from her native Bulgaria arranged by Mrs. James F. Fisher, who will attend the meeting in authentic Bulgarian dress.

Ida Odell Speaks For Founders Day

The Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls met for its regular meeting at the Pelican cafe Thursday. This was a special Founders Day meeting. Doris Peyton gave a short biographical sketch of, and introduced the speaker, Ida M. Odell, who gave the history and foundation of the Soroptimist club. It was interesting to note that on October 3, 28 years ago, a group of professional and executive women met in Oakland, Calif. and founded the first Soroptimist club and called it the Alameda County Soroptimist club, listing in the original charter roster 80 representative, successful and executive women.

Executive women in other towns became interested in the organization and from then on clubs increased and have been formed in the United States and internationally. The name Soroptimist is derived from two words "Soro" sister and "Optima", the best and highest good.

In 1930 the first international convention was held in London. There were 60 clubs at the convention and 50 more were organized by the end of the next four years.

At present in our own Northwest region now we have 65 clubs. By 1934, Soroptimist clubs had grown so numerous that the Soroptimist International Association was divided into three main groups: The American Federation, consisting now of Canada, United States, and South America with a club in Brazil, the Federation of Great Britain and Ireland, the Federation of Continental Europe. In turn the federations are broken down into regions, and the Klamath Falls Soroptimist belongs to the Northwest region, consisting of Alaska, Montana, Washington, Northern Idaho and Oregon. It was interesting to note, also, that when the Soroptimist International Association, American Federation, Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls was chartered it was the eighth club in the region. Each Soroptimist club gave 28 pennies to be put into a Fellowship Fund on this Founders Day.

The Soroptimist club has a four-year four-point program "Working for the World We Want," through spiritual values, through service to the community, through education, through co-operation in industry. The Klamath Falls club was organized in 1932 and it was interesting to see familiar names on that first program of organization. Mrs. F. W. Bertram, president; Mrs. Edie Garcelon, vice president; Miss Emma B. Page, secretary and Miss Isabelle Van Fleet, treasurer, with directors Mrs. Yetta Margulis, Mrs. Ruby C. Lyle, and Mrs. Ida M.
