CORN RALLIES, OTHERS EASE

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Most grains eased on the board of trade today, although corn rallied late in the session following reports of severe windstorms in Iowa.

Wheat encountered light selling pressure throughout the day. A little support came from mills, presumably lifting hedges against sales of flour to the army quartermaster corps.

Wheat closed 1/4% lower, December \$2.11 1/4%, corn was 1/4% lower to 1/2% higher, December \$1.18 1/4%, oats were unchanged to 1/4% lower, December 67 1/4%, rye was 1/4% lower to 1/2% higher, December \$1.48, soybeans were 1/4% lower, November \$22.22 1/4%, and land was 5 to 10 cents a hundred pounds higher, October \$11.35.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)—Stocks eased lower today in a market devoid of selling pressure.

The volume of business was at the rate of 1,100,000 shares for the entire day.

Traders noted that offerings contracted as prices slid down while buying enthusiasm mounted with rising quotations.

The rails as a group turned in the best performance with a majority of the leaders unchanged to higher.

Steeels and motors, on the other hand, stayed on the downside.

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Oregon CIO Raps Rent Control Ban

BEND, Oct. 10 (AP)—Decontrol of rents in some Oregon cities was criticized by the CIO state convention before the labor union delegates wound up their annual session Saturday night.

A resolution branded the new federal rent control as a "farce" IWA President James Fanning said union members had been lax, failing to make known their views at the city hearings, and allowing real estate lobbies and big property owners to dominate the testimony.

The decontrol of rents at Eugene was cited in the convention resolution. It said the action there had left workers "at the mercy of high rents and inflated residential values."

Lewis Attacks

In other final day resolutions, the removal of Federal Conciliation Service Regional Director Harry H. Lewis of Seattle from office was demanded. Harvey Nelson, a delegate of the Columbia river district council, charged that Lewis had "connived with the AFL carpenters and a small group of employers to destroy the IWA." He said this had occurred in 1945.

Political policy of the labor organization, particularly in the endorsement of candidates, was reviewed in the Saturday session. Senator Wayne Morse and Rep. Walter Norblad were named in the talks.

Morse, CVA

Manley Wilson of the IWA said "if we are for the CVA and Morse is against it, then we cannot endorse him. The CVA was given almost a death blow by Morse's statement."

Another IWA delegate, Harvey Nelson, declared Norblad "answered all of our questions right when he was in Oregon, but has answered them wrong in Washington, D. C., ever since."

'Hot' Pineapple

The "hot" pineapple dispute at The Dalles was reviewed by Matt Meehan, International Longshoremen's Union representative. Meehan said the cargo probably would not be touched until union conditions prevailed. He said the Hawaiian Pineapple company would have to drop its damage suits against the ILWU before any CIO longshoremen would handle the cargo.

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Scripps-Howard Editor Dies

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—George B. Parker Sr., 63, editor-in-chief of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, died here early today.

Editor-in-chief of the chain since 1927, Parker won a Pulitzer prize in 1936 for his editorials.

He is survived by a son, George B. Parker Jr., and a daughter, Mary Parker.

8 Arrested In Alturas Vice Raid

ALTURAS—Eight persons including one white man and seven Negroes were arrested in a raid against a vice ring in the colored section of Camp Newell Saturday night. The raid was conducted by state and Modoc county officers.

Dewey Eagan, chief liquor control officer of Northern California, headed a squad of eight board of equalization men, District Attorney Charles Lederer, Sheriff Glynn Johnson and deputies who conducted the midnight raid.

Officers said they found evidence of illegal traffic in liquor, prostitution and gambling and seized evidence of beer, wine, gambling equipment and one slot machine.

Ring Leader?

Clarence Hulett, 49-year-old Negro, was arrested as the ring leader and then released on \$1000 bond put up by members of the Growers association. Hulett is a labor contractor.

Also released under \$250 bond, was Alice Elizabeth Dean who, with two other Negroes, Stella Fields and Louise Taylor, were held for investigation of prostitution.

A. F. Bluford was arrested but released on investigation, but held in the Modoc county jail are Rufus Hall and Hendry Jenkins, Negroes, and Herman Brockman, a white harvest hand, the latter charged with drunkenness.

There was a casualty during the raid, when Eldridge Derrow, 43-year-old Oakland, Calif., Negro, jumped out a window and fractured his leg. Sheriff's officers took him to the hospital.

Charges will be filed following a complete investigation and District Attorney Lederer and Sheriff Johnson promised diligent search into the situation which was described as "the most flagrant violation of law ever uncovered in Modoc county."

The district attorney said he believed felony warrants may be issued if it is found conspiracy to violate gambling laws in Modoc county exist.

Death Claims Pioneer, Ed Bloomingcamp

Death claimed another old-timer to this region Sunday afternoon when Ed Bloomingcamp died at Hillside hospital following an illness of two weeks.

Mr. Bloomingcamp, about 80 years old, was born on the old family ranch at Bogus on Shuttle creek in the Topsy grade country. His childhood and youth were spent on the ranch, which is still owned by a sister, Elsie.

He and a brother George, who preceded him in death, had considerable ranch holdings at Bly, Lakeview, Hefley and in the Wocus section. They were prominent both in the sheep and cattle business.

Retired

Mr. Bloomingcamp sold his land several years ago and retired, making his home in Klamath Falls.

Funeral services will be held in Yreka and interment will be in the family plot at the cemetery there. The time of services will be announced by the Whitlock Memorial chapel.

He is survived by three brothers, Fred, Bill and Frank, all of whom live in California, a sister, Dolly, in San Francisco, and another sister, Elsie, of Bogus.

C. G. Andrus Died Sunday

Charles Gardner Andrus, 74, a resident of Klamath Falls for the past 13 years and a former Big Lakes Box company employee, died Sunday night at the family home, 2300 Union. Mr. Andrus had been in ill health the past two years.

He was born in Canby, Ore., November 13, 1874, and left there for Dayton, Wash., when a young boy. He married Arlo Bronson in 1900, and moved here 13 years ago.

Mr. Andrus is survived by his wife, six children and numerous other relatives. A complete obituary appears elsewhere in this paper.

Final rites will be held from Ward's chapel at 10 a. m. Tuesday with Rev. Martindale Woods officiating. Interment will be in Mountain View cemetery, Walla, Wash., on Thursday.
