

# City Council Scans Audit Of Budget

The city council embarked last night on a lengthy task of reading and discussing an auditor's report of the city budget for the fiscal year of 1948-1949.

The report compiled by J. Paul Matthews, local public accountant and auditor, was completed on September 2 of this year.

During the course of last night's meeting the city dads managed to wade through one third of the text prefacing the summaries of city fund transactions.

## Criticisms

In the text, Matthews made many comments and criticisms of several phases of the budget.

With regard to the allocation of tax revenues to various city funds it was noted that there had been some instance of improper computation. This situation was noted in funds allotted to the Klamath crematory, the Linkville cemetery, the employee's retirement fund and the recreation fund.

## Recreation Fund

Such an inequity was noticeable in the allotment to the recreation fund.

Another section of the report advised that some provision be made for recording of delinquent tax assessments receivable. It was felt that the city was losing out on a source of revenue.

# Near Record Corn Crop Estimated

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—The agriculture department today estimated this year's corn crop at 3,476,986,000 bushels, the second largest record.

This estimate is 48,733,000 bushels less than the 3,525,719,000 forecast a month ago. It compares with last year's record of 3,650,548,000 bushels and with the ten-year (1938-47) average of 2,787,628,000 bushels.

Wheat production was put at 1,126,226,000 bushels, or 2,855,000 less than the 1,129,081,000 forecast last month. It compares with the 1948 crop of 1,268,406,000 bushels and with the ten year average of 991,950,000.

Registration in the community college programs at Klamath Falls and Bend are running neck and neck with a total of 117 here and 116 in Bend.

In Klamath Falls, the total figure is broken down into 67 women and 50 men. Registrations in each class is as follows: typing, 40; accounting, 27; English composition, 27; history, 21; sociology, 15; English literature, 15; biological science, 15; and mathematics, 10.

Bend has 87 part time students and 29 full time, which is 12 or more hours.

Total registrations here are 179, which includes several people taking more than one course.

# Auto License Bills Readied

SALEM, Oct. 11 (AP)—Oregon's 500,000 automobile owners will get statements from Secretary of State Earl T. Newby next week telling them how much their new license plates will cost them.

With the new permanent plates expiring at different times in order to put the staggered expiration system into effect, the statements are necessary to let the owners know how much money to send in.

The plates will be mailed beginning November 15, but they can't be used until December 15. Numbers assigned to automobiles from now on will be the permanent numbers.

Newby said applications for special numbers can no longer be accepted. His office has issued about 16,000 special numbers.

## Anti-Socialist

Gerhardsen added that "our victory will not result in a stronger tendency towards socialization."

Foreign Minister Halvard M. Lange, who spearheaded Norway's drive to join the pact, was an easy victor.

The anti-red leadership of Prime Minister Einar Gerhardsen quickly interpreted the results, which are subject to a final count, as endorsements of Norway's signing of the Atlantic pact. The communists had bitterly assailed this step.

Labor appears from preliminary surveys to have taken 80 seats in the 150-member storting (parliament). This compares with its 76 seats in the old parliament.

The communists dropped seven seats, moving down from their previous 11 to four.

The results, by other parties (previous seats in brackets): conservatives, 23 (25); liberals, 22 (23); agrarians, 13 (10); Christian democrats, 13 (10).

Gerhardsen, in a post-election statement today, said that "since the communist party was the only one that made Norway's adherence to the Atlantic pact an election issue, we may safely say that the voters have given their approval to the government's foreign policy."
