Post Office Job Exam Slated

Federal civil service announces an examination for appointment to the positions of substitute clerk, post office service.

Persons who desire permanent positions at Oretch will have an opportunity to take a civil service examination leading to probational appointment with permanent classified civil service status.

No special experience or education is required, but applicants must take a written examination, which includes a Sorting Test, and a Following Instructions Test. Applicants must actually reside within the delivery of the post office for which examined, or be bona fide patrons of such office.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 50, except that these age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.

Further information on this examination and the necessary application forms may be obtained from the Postmaster, Post Office, Oretch, Oregon, or from the Director, 11th U. S. civil service region, room 302 federal office building, Seattle 4, Wash.

This examination will be held at Klamath Falls on October 29, at 8:30 a. m.

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23 Years Ago

Monday, October 11, 1926—NEW YORK (AP)—Athletes whose vim and vitality gave the cowbells of St. Louis a chance to ring again when many Misourians feared they were to be forever mute, began figuring how much one can buy with \$5,841.51. This represents the money to be paid each member of the St. Louis Cardinals for winning the world's series. The Yanks are calculating the purchasing power of \$4,417.75, and reflecting that the difference was determined by one \$50,000 run. The Cards won the 7th and deciding world's series game 3 to 2.

Tuesday, October 12, 1926—* * * This court, so far as I'm concerned, is closed until Saturday and maybe longer; I am going hunting and nothing can stop me." Thus, Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt walked out of justice court this morning. The magistrate is but four years away from the four score milestone in his life but the time has not come when he can't devote a week's time each year to deer hunting.

Wednesday, October 13, 1926—Two publishers, one whose tenure in this city expired this morning with the advent of the other, stood before a large audience in the chamber of commerce this noon and announced the sale of The Evening Herald. After 20 years of ups and downs in the newspaper business, E. J. Murray, owner of The Herald, veteran of the transfer of his newspaper to Bruce Dennis, told Oregon newspapermen.

Thursday, October 14, 1926—Second floor of the city hall is undergoing a rejuvenation. Painters and calciminers are attempting to wipe away the stains, the dirt, the holes in the walls that have come from many years of hard usage.

Friday, October 15, 1926—Long pending five million dollar law suit, brought by Klamath Indians against the United States government, will come to a head within the next few days when depositions from Indians will be taken in a hearing which will probably be held on the reservation.

Saturday, October 16, 1926—White Pelican hotel, Main and Esplanade, was completely destroyed by fire today in one of the biggest conflagrations in the history of the city. The hotel was valued at \$300,000; it carried more than \$200,000 insurance.

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
