BRIDGE TELETYPE. A dozen years from now we are likely to be reminding ourselves that today's arrival of Pandit Jawaharal Nehru on his first trip to this country was a far-reaching event...

Nehru, who will be 60 on the 14th of next month, not only was born into a family of great wealth but he is a Kashmiri Brahmin - the highest aristocracy of all India...

At the outset he showed little interest in the independence movement, but soon he joined and thereafter devoted his whole life to the ideal. He became one of the most devoted disciples of Mohandas K. Gandhi...

So it was natural that Gandhi should have designated Nehru as his "political heir" and that the disciple should become the first prime minister of the dominion of India when Britain granted independence...

Nehru is an internationalist and a socialist and is a bitter opponent of dictatorship. He is, however, what might be described as a middle-of-the-road socialist. He believes in what he calls a "mixed economy" in which the state assumes management of key industries...

No Surprise to Most Voters That Russ Had Atomic Bomb

By GEORGE GALLUP. PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 10—Russia's possession of the atom bomb hardly came as much of a surprise to the American people...

Most of them figured as far back as two years ago that the Russians had the A-bomb secret. That probably explains why the American public accepted President Truman's announcement recently about the Russian bomb so calmly...

In October, 1947—two years before the week—the American Institute of Public Opinion asked a cross-section of the nation's voters: "Do you think any other country is already making a tom-bomb?"

The voters who were interviewed replied: "Those who replied 'yes' were asked, 'What country?' Most of them said Russia."

This widespread and, as it turned out, highly realistic belief that the "secret" of the atom bomb was not only impossible to protect but was in the hands of the Russians as early as 1947, helps to explain why the American public consistently opposed the idea that we should stop making atom bombs and destroy those already produced...

They believed this would have no effect in deterring Russia from developing bombs or in inducing Russia to agree to international control of atomic energy. What the public's reaction will be now that the Russian bomb is a known fact will be shown in a series of surveys which are soon to be started by the institute.

Highlights of Surveys. But here are the highlights of public reaction to the whole issue of atomic energy as shown in surveys up to the present:

1—The majority of voters have expressed the belief that scientists will be able to develop a defense against the bomb.

2—The public has consistently felt that the atom bomb does NOT make large and powerful armies or navies obsolete.

3—Approximately one adult in ten cities of half a million population or more had, by August, 1948, given some thought to moving elsewhere to escape the dangers of a possible atom bomb attack.

4—The awesome destructiveness of the bomb has made a deep impression on the public mind. In 1947, the great majority of voters questioned about the destructive power of the bomb seemed greater than they had at first thought.

5—No need for a change in attitude toward Russia if she developed the atom bomb was seen by voters polled in 1947. The largest single number felt that if Russia had the bomb our policy should continue to be to keep on friendly terms with her but not to make too many concessions.

6—Concerning a third world war, the weight of sentiment has been that the discovery of the atom bomb decreases the possibility of another armed conflict, on the grounds that fear of retaliation would discourage nations from attacking one another.

7—The average voter is optimistic about the development of atomic energy for peaceful industrial uses. He believes that trains and airplanes will be driven by atomic energy in about 10 years time.

8—A few weeks before the announcement of the Russian A-bomb,

the public voted against the U. S. sharing atomic energy secrets with England. Whether this opinion has changed since the announcement will be shown in future institute surveys.
