Grid History

With the traditional game with the Medford Black Tornado only two days away, a history of the grid rivalry dating back to 1914 is interesting.

During this long span, there have been 36 games between the cross-mountain rivals.

During the 1917-18 war years, the two eleven did not meet.

There were double games in 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1925.

The 36-game tale is not bright for the Klamath Pelicans.

Klamath has won only four games, Medford 26 and there have been four ties.

Under Frank Ramsey, during RED HURD the hey-day of Klamath football the Pelicans registered 32 to 0 and 40 to 7 victories over the Black Tornado.

The other two Pel victories were in 1929, a 7 to 0 win under Al Sinclair and win by margin of a field goal, 3 to 0, in 1936, with Les Avritt at the coaching helm.

The one game that old-time fans would like to forget is the 94 to 0 spanking administered by the Black Tornado in 1927. (Major Robert A. Thompson still isn't talking about this one.)

This seems an appropriate time to make a prediction on Friday night's game when the Pelicans will be pitching for their fifth win over the Tornadoes.

I think the Pels will be high for this, the 37th meeting of the perennial foes.

You can discount the talk of the Medford jinx for this fracas. If the Medfords score their 29th win, they will do so on grid talent, not with a double-whammy.

The Pelican line should outcharge the Medford forward wall. Regardless of the press raves regarding Jack Morris, the Tornado ace won't blast holes in the Pelican line.

Medford has never been a strong passing team, except for an occasional try in the air to open the defense.

Morris will be matched with the aggressive galloping of Joe Nichols and Gene Carlson.

I look for a close contest with Medford no more than a one-touchdown favorite. The score: Medford 13, Klamath Falls 7.

Swan Song

The Quarterback club gave out with its last dying squawk at last Monday's meeting, moving over for a brand new organization, temporarily at least dubbed the Boosters' club.

The folding up of the Quarterbacks marks the end of 12 years of activity. Reason for the disbanding of the club was given as a decline in interest (only 10 or 12 members bothered to show for the weekly Monday confabs).

Purpose of the new organization, according to word from founders, is that it will not operate as an advisory group for football coaches. This practice, overemphasized, was no doubt a major reason for the downfall of the Quarterbackers.

The aim of the new club, I understand, is to boost not only local football activities, but to take an active interest in ALL sports and ALL school activities.

There is a wealth of opening interest, new blood, and with proper organization and operation, the new club should prove successful.

The Quarterback club got its start in 1937, the first year Snowy Gustafson coached the Pelicans. Opening interest in local football turned into "civic quarterbacking" in some instances and resulted in the gradual decay of the organization.

Let it be noted there is no bad blood between the old and the new. The Quarterbackers merely moved over for a new organization.

Owls, Pels Due For Stiff Test

Tech Injury-Riddled for SOC Tilt; KF Face Medford

The Klamath Pelicans and the Oregon Tech Owls are preparing for major grid battles this week-end on Modoc field.

The Pelicans meet Medford in the 37th showing of the Pelican-Tornado battle Friday night. Saturday night the Oregon Tech squad, torn apart with injuries, meets probably the stiffest competition of the current season (with the possible exception of the Fort Lewis Red Raiders of Southern Oregon college).

Both the Pels and the Owls will face undefeated clubs. The Black Tornado has blown over Roseburg, Tillamook, Redding and Eureka in starts this year, although they had to wage a last-half rally to beat Eureka, 20 to 0.

The Red Raiders suffered a tie last week against San Francisco State when the Californians trotted out a passing attack in the last twelve minutes of play to gain a 21-21 knot. This deadlock was the only score to mar an otherwise perfect season.

Humboldt State and Lewis and Clark are numbered among the Red Raiders' victims.

Jack Morris, ace fullback for the Medfords, suffered an injured ankle in the Eureka fray, but should be ready for the Pelicans.

All in all, the Tornadoes will outscore the Pels, with 220-pound Leo Parker, tackle, leading in the weight department.

With Vaughn Clark, quarter; Bill Buckingham and Hal Faulkner, a former Pel, at halfbacks; and Morris at fullback, the Medford team boasts plenty of speed. Morris and Buckingham are both track speed artists.

The Oregon Tech injury list would bring grins only from hospital personnel. Centers Dick Mills and Wayne Chapman are out with knee and ankle injuries respectively. A knee hurt will also keep Don Gray, tackle, on the bench.

Russ Johnston, tackle, may see action with one arm taped up while End John Pasch, co-captain, is nursing a case of flu.

Jack Taylor, quarterback, may operate offensively but a shoulder injury will keep him from producing at full strength.

The only bright note on the mile-high campus is the news that Scooting Chuck Warren will be back for action. Warren was banged out-of-bounds in the Lassen game and his right eye gouged. His blinker is almost back to normal now.

Ken Miller, fleet halfback, was bruised considerably in the Lassen game, but he'll be ready.

Coleb Dale Daugherty has been running the Owls through pass defense drills. The Cougars beat the Owls 39 to 19 when they unfurled an accurate aerial game last Saturday night in Susanville.

Only a slight hip injury to Dick Petzoldt, guard, will keep the Pels from full health against Medford.

The Red Raiders are loaded with backfield savvy with Baldy Foster, quarterback, Johnny Ventjer at full and Barney Riggs in the starting role.

Also a former Pelican along with Foster, Sam Redkey may see some action at guard.

McElhenny May Go Back In Action

SEATTLE, Oct. 12 (AP)—The possibility that sophomore Fullback Hugh McElhenny may be back in harness for this Saturday's clash with Stanford cheered the University of Washington football camp today.

The flashy, hard-running ace saw his first action yesterday since the Minnesota game as he took part in a heavy scrimmage session. His ankle didn't appear to bother him but he obviously was soft from the two-week layoff.

McElhenny's return would boost the Husky stock mightily, inasmuch as two other first string backs—Quarterback Don Heinrich and Halfback Rolly Kirkby—also have shaken off their hurts and will be back in action. Fullback Hank Tiedemann still is hospitalized, however, from effects of penicillin.

Meanwhile, Athletic Director Harvey Cassill announced there would be no change in the university's plans to take on strong intercollegiate opponents each year despite the criticism that has arisen from scheduling Notre Dame and Minnesota this year.

The Minnesota series is booked through 1952 and Illinois will be the opponent for a home and home series in 1950-51.

Cassill countered accusations that the Huskies are getting out of their league in such games as Minnesota and Notre Dame by asserting that it's impossible to foresee three or four years in advance who's going to be tough and who isn't.

"These games have to be lined up well ahead of time," Cassill said. "At the same time, you can't foresee how strong or how weak the Washington material will be."

Racial Ban Draws Fire

SPOKANE, Oct. 12 (AP)—Another bowling league has withdrawn from the American Bowling Congress because of the "ABC's racial ban."

Latest to take the action is the eight-team Mechanical Knights circuit composed of Spokane newspaper printers. It had been affiliated with the ABC for 20 years.

The action stemmed from an ABC directive to the Boeing Bowling league in Seattle declaring that Japanese-American employees could not compete in an ABC-sanctioned circuit.

Investigation Bussey Eighth Fatality

DETROIT, Oct. 10 (AP)—Police and boxing officials pressed an investigation today into the death of a young fighter who suffered fatal injuries in a Detroit ring.

Talmadge Bussey, 25-year-old Negro lightweight, died of a blood clot on the brain yesterday, 11 hours after a solid head blow by Luther Rawlings of Chicago sent him sprawling into the ropes.

An emergency operation to remove the clot proved futile.

Police Inspector George Kimball of the homicide squad quickly launched an investigation. He met for a time late yesterday with officials of the Arcadia ring, Bussey's handlers and the seconds for Rawlings.

Bussey was the eighth boxer to be injured fatally in the ring this year. Six-ounce gloves were used in the battle, although the National Boxing association code calls for eight-ounce.

Champ Faces Young Marlene

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 12 (AP)—Defending Champion Polly Riley today faces a 15-year-old sensation in the feature match of the second round of the women's Texas open golf meet.

Marlene Bauer of Lang Beach, Calif., yesterday breezed past Mrs. W. K. Stripling Jr., Fort Worth, 9 and 7.

The tournament medalist and winner of the western and national junior championships was two under par for the 11 holes.

Title Fight Brings Lively Ticket Sale

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12—William P. Kyne, the promoter, today announced an advance seat sale totaling \$115,000 for the world's heavyweight championship between Ezzard Charles of Cincinnati, title holder, and Pat Valentino, of San Francisco, to be held Friday night, October 14, at the Cow Palace.

With the fight three days away and demand for tickets holding very brisk, Kyne looks for a capacity seated house of \$199,553 before the doors open at the arena.

"It's terrific, this sale," Kyne declared. "It will set a record for any world championship held west of the Rockies."

Profits from the championship, said Kyne, will go to the Livermore, Calif., Veterans hospital fund.

The champion Charles looks sharp in National Hall gym workouts, drawing near capacity crowds daily. John Henry Lewis, former world's light heavyweight champion, visited Charles' workout today, and prophesied "Valentino ought to have his hands full." Of course, the Charles camp followers ate up these words, but from across the city the bushy haired Valentino took on new sparring partners of main event caliber to quicken his boxing. Oakland Billy Smith, who fights Grant Butcher on the Charles-Valentino card, has started working with Valentino, giving him a good work. John Donnelly of Los Angeles and Bob Dunlap, Oakland main eventer, also spar with Pat.

SPARRING MATCH

The champion himself added a main eventer, Andy Walker, San Francisco heavy, to his training crew. In the first three rounds with Walker, Charles received for some stiff rights to the body.

The East coast is waking up to the fight in demand for press tickets. Latest is Van Emery, veteran New York Sun writer.

Jake Mintz, Charles' manager, said the champion will box and do bag work daily at National hall, up to the day of the championship. Charles weighs 185, five pounds over what he expects to carry into the ring.

Tonnemaker Lineman Of the Week

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—Clayton Tonnemaker, rugged 240-pound Minnesota center, was selected today as the lineman of the week in the third Associated Press poll of the season.

Tonnemaker's devastating play against Northwestern on Saturday won him top honors. He was outstanding on defense as line-backer and made many important tackles.

Minnesota won, 21-7, and in the words of Don Heap, assistant Northwestern coach, "It was that Tonnemaker who wrecked us in the first half." Minnesota held a 14-0 lead at the half.

Tonnemaker, a product of Edison high, Minneapolis, wrestled brewery kags last summer to strengthen his arms and shoulders. In the opinion of George Svendsen, Minnesota assistant coach, "Tunny is the best college center and best prospect I've ever seen. Minnesota never has had an All-American center, but Tunny will correct that."

Tonnemaker joins Howard Houston, Harvard tackle, and Art Weiner, North Carolina end, who gained the lineman award in the first two polls.

This week's nominations included Joe Clout, Washington end.
