

Austin Holds Russ A-Bomb Count Bid Another Red Trick

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 12 (AP)—Russia has renewed her demand for a world wide count of atomic bombs by the United Nations. U. S. Delegate Warren Austin called the Soviet move "another attempt to fool the public."

The Soviet demand was made by Deputy Foreign Minister Jakob Malik late yesterday in the U. N. security council. It called for a tally of all weapons, from atom bombs to airplanes and artillery, from battleships to bayonets. Each nation would report on its own weapons under Malik's proposal, with no provision for checking on the truth of the statements.

Worthless Task
Warren Austin, U. S. delegate who is this month's chairman of the council, did not answer Malik on the floor. But immediately after the meeting he told newsmen: "A census of weapons without verification is meaningless. This is another attempt to fool the public."

"The proposal for the addition of atomic bombs to the census adds nothing new," Austin said. "It continues to reflect an unwillingness on the part of the Soviet union to recognize the real nature of the atomic problem."

The Russian proposal was not acted on and Malik refused to go into detail on it when he spoke to newsmen after the meeting.

Russ A-Bombs?
Malik was directly asked if Russia has atomic weapons.

He answered, "read the Tass communication."

That Soviet press agency said on September 25 that the Russians have atomic weapons at their disposal. The agency statement followed disclosure by President Truman that an atomic explosion took place recently in Russia.

Malik's statements yesterday in the security council took on added interest because it was the first Russian statement of atomic policy since Truman's disclosure.

His resolution demanding the over-all tally was the first time that Russia has put its demand into a formal resolution. But the Russians have always opposed moves for an arms census unless it includes atomic weapons and have always said they should be outlawed. A few minutes before Malik made his proposal, he cast Russia's 39th veto in the security council to kill a French proposal for conventional arms-counting — excluding the A-bomb—and the establishment of confidence among the nations. It did not include atomic weapons, Malik complained.

The Ukraine, only Soviet satellite on the 11-nation security council, voted with Russia.

County Road Costs Heavy This Summer

Approximately \$200,000 worth of road surfacing was done this summer by the Klamath county road department, according to a summary of work compiled by County Engineer Wally Hector.

Much of the money was spent in repairing roads damaged by the severe freeze of last winter.

Hector said 61 miles of county roads received some sort of asphalt treatment this summer. About 11.5 miles of that was new construction, virtually all in Langell valley.

Resurfacing
Some 17 miles of road, principally in the suburban area of Klamath Falls, was resurfaced. In most instances, Hector said, the resurfacing amounted almost to complete reconstruction.

Seal coats of oil were put on

about 29 miles of road surfaced last year in Poe and Langell valleys and around Malin, and dust coats of oil were placed on another 13 miles of road.

A total of 50 cars of oil was used in the work, and the total expenditure of \$200,000 was estimated since the county does not keep cost accounting records on its work.

Calm Lightens Ship Danger
SEATTLE, Oct. 11 (AP)—Subsiding winds in the North Pacific exact concern today over the propellerless Panamanian freighter Navigator.

The coast guard cutter Chautauqua was standing by, nearly 1000 miles at sea.

The Chautauqua, stationed as a weather observer and a rescue ship in the area, reported today that the wind had moderated to 25 knots.

BRIDGES TO PORTLAND
PORTLAND, Oct. 12 (AP)—Longshore union members here are expecting International President Harry Bridges tomorrow for a first hand report. A spokesman said Bridges doubtless will report on the strike settlement at Hawaii.

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
