## Klamath One Of Leaders In Deer Kills

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—Nearly 3000 Oregon hunters have reported their deer season took—generally excellent—but the total is less than a third of a year ago.

The state game commission reported that the early returns on cards which hunters are required to send always run high on kills since those who fail to bag a deer in the first week generally wait until the season's end before reporting. Out of 2965 cards received to date, 2935 reported kills.

Lake, Deschutes, Klamath and Tillamook counties lead in the number of kills.

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C. A. Lockwood, game director, said a procedure of cross-checking reports has been set up to enable the commission to learn which hunters do not report. License applications can be turned down next year if no report is made this year, he said. He did not say, however, that this was contemplated. He said only that he "hoped" it would not be necessary.

## North Bend Pilot In Fatal Crash

NORTH BEND, Oct. 13 (AP)—Private Pilot Larry Reynolds, North Bend, plummeted to his death yesterday in a mud flat of Coos Bay near the airport here.

County Coroner Brewer Mills said Reynolds was alive when pulled from the wreckage but died before

he was carried to an ambulance on shore. Witnesses said the aircraft stalled at low altitude.
