

Spud Festival Prizes, Regulations Announced

MERRILL—Exhibit regulations and prize list for the 13th annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival have been announced as follows:

Exhibitors are requested to notify festival headquarters of their intent to enter on or by Thursday, October 20.

Exhibitors must use labels and tags furnished by headquarters. All exhibits in Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 9 are to remain the property of Klamath Basin Potato Festival. All other exhibits must be claimed on October 24 and any not so claimed on October 25 will be forfeited. If there are less entries than premiums in any lot the judge is not required to award the first prize if the entries are of inferior quality.

Exhibits should be delivered at the Merrill high school on Thursday, October 20. Any produce not listed may be exhibited if desired and arrangements made with festival headquarters.

Ribbons representing first prize in all lots and classes will be placed on the winning exhibits and must be presented at the Festival headquarters on Monday, October 24, for the awards.

Employment Up in County Last Month

An increase in agricultural employment toward the end of September resulted in a small employment gain in the over-all picture in Klamath county, the Oregon state employment service announced. Building construction showed a gain over August, with permits issued totaling \$58,043. Lumber and logging firms continued at the same level of employment.

Peak Ahead

With potato harvest starting toward the end of September and the peak expected October 15, transient labor increased, with 651 immigrants counted for September. The number unemployed September 30 was about \$32, approximately the same as August. The total unemployed stayed at a high level despite agricultural placements due to the influx of out-of-state workers.

The future employment picture revealed that agriculture will absorb extra help for the next 15 days for potato harvest. Construction jobs were still available with adequate labor to complete the jobs.

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Veteran SP Dispatcher Retiring

DUNSMUIR—David A. Stickney, Southern Pacific train dispatcher here for the past 25 years, this week announced his retirement from duties after more than 46 years of service in railroad work.
