

'Military Campaign' Against Conservation Charged by Forester

SEATTLE, Oct. 13 (AP)—A virtual "military campaign" has been launched against conservation programs in the United States, Dr. Claus J. Murie of Moose, Wyo., told the nation's foresters last night.

The director of the Wilderness Society, speaking before the Society of American Foresters, said opposition to conservation threatens "the pattern of our culture."

"Invaluable winter range for big game and marshlands for waterfowl are to be sacrificed," Dr. Murie said. "Our country as we know it, is in danger. Our free running streams are to be submerged. Rich bottomlands are to be put under water. Roads and engineering structures are to penetrate our recreation areas."

In other talks during yesterday's opening sessions, William N. Parke, regional recreation planning officer for the U. S. forest service, Portland, said experiments have proved the feasibility of charging admission to visitors in forest camps in Oregon and Washington.

A program to teach non-destructive nature appreciation, starting in the primary grades, was urged by H. L. Bill, assistant superintendent of Mount Rainier national park.

Timbermen Praised
Governor Langlie, speaking at a night session, praised the state's timber interests for their "broad program of conservation and education."

He said payrolls in the lumber industry are as large today as in 1926 although only a third as much timber is being cut.

"That," he said, "is because foresters have learned to work effectively." The governor reiterated his opposition to the proposed Columbia valley administration.

Angry Bruin Hospitalizes Alaska Man

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Oct. 13 (AP)—An Alaska roadhouse owner was recovering today from a mauling by an angry she-grizzly that necessitated 200 stitches in his face, arm, scalp and leg.

Dan Luddington, owner of the Summit Lodge roadhouse, 18 miles southeast of here, said he met the grizzly and her cub near Summit lake last week.

Gun Misfired
The animal felled him when his rifle misfired on the first shot. "She was pawing, mauling and raking me with her claws and I was trying to get away and at the same time reload my rifle," Luddington said from his Fairbanks hospital bed.

"It seemed like my head was in her mouth when I got another shell in the chamber. I managed to get my rifle around while she was dragging me by one leg.

"The bullet hit her in the chest and she dropped."
Luddington managed to drag himself a mile to a road where he was picked up by an Alaska Freight Lines truck.

Polio Increased Last Week

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—There were 23 new poliomyelitis cases in Oregon last week, one ending in a fatality, the state board of health reported today.

The year's tally to date is 201 cases and 15 deaths.
Portland had five of the new cases reported. Marion county had three. The others were scattered throughout the state.

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—A firm that bought the assets of the bankrupt Sherwood bulb gardens was ordered yesterday to cease operating a nursery business without a license. The state department of agriculture order was to halt the new owner's operations until a license application has been acted on.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—A Long Beach doctor was found beaten to death today in a Lover's Lane, apparently a robbery victim.

Police identified the victim as Dr. Donald Buge, 50, who has a medical center at Long Beach.

Det. Sgt. George Burroughs said the doctor had been playing poker at a club in nearby Gardena. They added that he had left the club without his wife.

When found, the pockets of the doctor's suit had been turned out. Nearby were keys to an automobile, fifty cents in change, a single cigarette and books of matches.

His face was so battered and bloody, it was difficult to determine if he might have been shot also, the detectives said.
