Second Growth Timber Weaker Than Virgin

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Second growth timber, being used in increasing quantities, is all right for home building and other light construction but is not as strong as virgin growth, two forestry experts reported today.

"New crop" Douglas fir is somewhat lighter, coarser grained and more easily broken than the "old growth" or virgin material, J. B. Alexander, of the Forest Products Laboratories of Canada, told the American Society for Testing materials.

The same thing is true generally of Redwood, Prof. Eugene Fritz of the University of California, reported.

Douglas fir is the number 1 timber crop of the Pacific Northwest. In British Columbia, Washington and Oregon there are about 12½ million acres of the virgin growth remaining, and about the same acreage of second growth, Alexander said.

Second growth stuff is being used more and more. Ultimately there will be no more lumber from virgin Douglas fir.

However, second growth trees can be made virtually as good as the originals, Alexander said, by slowing down their rate of growth.

The new trees are coarser grained

than the old, and have a higher percentage of resin, which makes them more resistant to decay.
