

State Training School Terms For 2 Girls

Ardis Stark, 16, and Audrey Jean Mendey, 14, Kelllogg, Ida, girls who attacked and severely beat a juvenile home matron here September 27, today were ordered committed to the Hillcrest training school for girls at Salem.

The girls were taken into juvenile court before Judge David R. Vandenberg this morning. They will be taken to Salem next week.

Indefinite
The commitments are for an indefinite period, possibly until the girls become 21 years old.

The teen-agers were picked up here September 18 after arriving in Klamath Falls with two young men, Ra Mocris, 20, and Gene Arthur Miller, 22.

The two men were arrested for stealing a car but were later charged with contributing to the delinquency of the minor girls and sentenced to five years each in prison.

Death Claims John Lemire

John Baptiste Lemire, well known Klamath Falls resident of the past 20 years, died in St. Vincent's hospital Friday at 1:40 a.m. Final rites will be held from Sacred Heart church here on Tuesday with a requiem mass commencing at 9:30 a.m.

Mr. Lemire was a native of Stillwater, Minn., and was 68 years at the time of his passing. He is survived by his wife, Diana, six sons, J. C. and Harry of this city, Ronald of Duluth, Minn., Charles of Seattle, Ray of San Francisco and Ben of Portland; three daughters, Sister Genevieve, OSB, Crookston, Minn., Claire Lemire of Minneapolis, and Mrs. W. B. Martin of Seattle. There are also three brothers, a sister and five grandchildren who survive.

Judge Grants 2 Extensions

An extension of time in the hearing of two criminal cases was granted in circuit court by Judge David Vandenberg yesterday afternoon.

A continuation in the case of Lewis E. Murphy, charged with forgery by impersonation, was granted till 10 a.m., October 19.

Murphy was brought back from Omaha, Neb., by Deputy Sheriff Marion Barnes, and appeared for indictment on the charge of forgery. It is believed that he passed several hundred dollars worth of bad checks during the summer months, while posing as a timekeeper for the Arundel construction company.

Study Time
On request of Murphy's attorney, E. E. Driscoll, the hearing was held over to the later date. Driscoll told Judge Vandenberg he wanted time to make a study of the indictment. Murphy was remanded to custody of the sheriff.

A continuation was also granted in the case of the state of Oregon versus Richard Samuel Shuck. Shuck was scheduled to appear in circuit court on October 31 to face a charge of negligent homicide.

Anderson Killed
The charge resulted from an automobile accident in June — in which Robert Henry Anderson, 72-year-old farmer and pioneer Klamath resident, was instantly killed.

The continuation was granted to December 12, because of illness in the family of Attorney Richard B. Maxwell, Shuck's lawyer.

Chiloquin Boy Grigger Hurt

Richard Clark, 14-year-old Chiloquin high school boy, suffered an arm injury in Chiloquin's game with Sacred Heart academy, played at Henry Friday afternoon.

He was brought to the Klamath Medical clinic for doctor's care where he was found to have a bad break of the left forearm.

The injury was treated and Richard was well enough to attend the big Klamath-Medford game last night.

Don Krider Succeeds Merton Stein

Merton Stein, for two years assistant secretary-treasurer of the Klamath Production Credit association, is now located in Spokane, Wash., where he is associated with the production credit corporation as credit examiner.

Don Krider has taken over Stein's work in the local office. Mrs. Stein and children are remaining here for the present.

Bryant Sentence Held for Check

Charles E. Bryant, 28, who has pleaded guilty to forgery and was up for sentence this morning in circuit court, was sent back to the county jail until a check is made of his previous criminal record.

Bryant admittedly served 14 months in a Texas pen for forgery and received a five-year suspended sentence for passing bad checks.

He is charged now with forging the name of Jerry Rajnus, Malin farmer, to a check for \$47.12, and has admitted forging three checks here.

State Leaders Attend Rehab Meeting Here

Interesting features of the state division of vocational rehabilitation were brought out in a two-day session at a quarterly staff meeting at Oregon Technical Institute which ended here late yesterday afternoon.

Problems of the rehab office, in service training of the counselors, progress of the clients and an inspection of OTI where 19 men are enrolled under the rehabilitation program, took up considerable time.

First Here
The meeting at OTI was the first state meeting held here, but men and women through the state were high in their praise of the classes and opportunities offered at OTI.

Klamath county has a low case load in the rehabilitation picture, but this may mean that the community is supporting the program as individuals or business firms, it was observed.

At Friday's meeting, the staff met with Mrs. Altha Urquhart, head of the welfare commission, and Mr. Edith Compton, secretary of the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health association, both groups dealing with phases of the rehab program.

Leaders
Charles F. Feike of Salem, director of vocational rehabilitation, Irving Gray of Salem, state supervisor of counselors, and J. J. Humbird, counselor of the Portland office, headed the group.

Much of the work of the division is not well known because there is little time and money to expend in publicizing the work. The Employ the Physically Handicapped Week is sponsored by this office and has done much to make the public conscious of the work done by the state organization.

OTI Tour
Following a tour of OTI with Director Winston Furrine, Feike said that OTI had as fine facilities to offer as any place in the state of Oregon.

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Travel, Auto Courts And Ice Cream

LAST WEEK we were putting out some figures on the travel in this state. Charley Stark called this morning with a little more dope. Oregon ranked second on the roster of cars visiting Lassen park in California last year. A total of 1323 Oregon cars entered the park during the year, showing that Oregon gets out on the road, too. Californians went all-out on Lassen visits with 49,015 cars going up to the place. Washington was in third place, keeping the Pacific coast together as a unit.

ON the general subject of travel. There have been many changes in the past few years. For one thing more and more people are swinging to the motel type of accommodation rather than stopping at hotels in the small towns. Most of the motels are new, clean, spacious and well run. The last few I stayed in were even offering room service. You get comparative quiet in most motels and better beds than will be found in the average small hotel, which is also usually many, many years old.

The only tough part of staying in the motels is getting something to eat. Sometimes you hit it right on the head and there will be a good spot to eat nearby. Other times you get stuck out miles away from anything but a greasy spoon. But it's still the best way to stay.

REMEMBER 15 years ago when the auto court was the only thing? You brought along your own bedding and equipment and rented nothing but a cabin with a set of bed springs in it. The washrooms were a centrally located feature in most of them and required a lengthy walk. Cumberston to say the least. Now that the motel has been evolved you can find anything from a suite of rooms to a private cottage and quite a few of them are equipped with swimming pools and outdoor terraces.

HERE'S another fact which probably won't help you out much: Americans consume five and one-half billion pints of ice cream annually. That's an average of 37 pints a head. Personally I can do without even one pint. If Uncle Sam didn't do anything else for the boys in service during the war he saw to it that there was plenty of ice cream. They even had armored freezers so they could serve ice cream in the battle zones. I still get slightly ill whenever I'm faced with a brick of the stuff. But the figures show that I'm strictly in the minority.
