High School Enrollments Chalk Up Gain

After the first flurry of early enrollment has settled down, Klamath Union high school registration figures still show a marked increase over last year.

Total to date this year at KUHS is 1329 compared to the same time last year when it was 1286. A surprising feature is that over half the total enrollment represents bus students, more than ever before in the history of the school.

Night Drop
Elementary schools show a slight drop from last year with 2236 now and 2271 in 1948.

At KUHS, the total enrollment is broken down into 386 freshmen, 249 sophomores, 294 juniors and 291 seniors. Biggest gain is with the senior class which had 239 at this time last year.
