## Library Club Has Interesting Program

Austria, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria were represented at the Monday meeting of the Library club by several natives of these countries who are now local citizens, and the theme of "Better Human Relations Through Art Education" was adequately carried out by their contributions to the program.

Opening event were songs and dances in the Yugoslavian manner by the popular Louisa Taucher family. Mrs. Truman Lynch of Tulelake accompanied on the piano, and little Dianne and Mary Taucher added to the color in their miniature replicas of their mother's native costume.

The large audience was completely captivated by the speaker of the day, Mrs. Annelly Uherek, who has recently come from Vienna with her family to make her home in Olene. Mrs. Uherek is a student of creative dancing and has studied in Vienna, Home and Dresden and taken collegiate work in the College of the Pacific and Mills college.

Using many personal experiences as examples, Mrs. Uherek made a strong plea for better understanding between nations and showed how this could often be accomplished through the common bond of the arts. It was her contention that if we admire the great art of the world, we can better understand the attitude of the people. Better relations can come not only through leaders, but from the "little peoples" of the world, she said, and also maintained that since art is a common ground it should be taught to all ages in school and thus instill respect and understanding of foreign nations from the start.

Mrs. Uherek closed her remarks with a brief history of the dance, showing how it is the oldest form of art and reached its height in the Grecian empire. Much credit was given to American Isadora Duncan for bringing the dance to its present greatness. The stiffness of the ballet was contrasted with the fluidity of the modern dance which frees the body and soul of the dancer for expression of his thoughts. Around the room were pencil sketches of dancers in actions provided by Mrs. Uherek.

Mrs. James Farmer was the Bulgarian representative to complete the Balkan picture. Attired in a colorful embroidered costume she explained her collection of Bulgarian pottery miniatures and linen pieces and presided at the tea table. An exhibit of hand-loomed pieces, pottery, printed material and hand-made cards was provided by the Art Center and arranged by Mrs. U. S. Balentine. Floral decorations of fall foliage and blooms done by Mrs. S. R. Brown filled the corners of the room. The tea table, presided over by Mrs. Farmer and Mrs. George Clark, held an autumn centerpiece of fruit and leaves.

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# Report Given From Area League Meet

Discussion and reports of the Area Meeting held in Portland, October 6th and 7th, occupied much of the time at a League of Women's Voters board meeting. Mrs. Meta Gilbert was hostess to the group in her home on LeRoy.

The Portland area meeting took as its theme "What Does the Citizen Need to Know to be a Responsible Voter?" and various speakers touched on different aspects of the theme. Mrs. George H. Engles had as her topic "A Complete Voters' Service Program" with an analysis of the year-round voting information the citizen needs and what the league has provided.

In the afternoon session Mrs. I. E. Heuberger and Mayor Dorothy Lee speaking. Their talks gave a digest of political parties—their organization and history, powers and responsibilities and the place of the individual citizen within party activity.

Mrs. John Yaden, who is state chairman of the voters' service committee, introduced a panel discussion on a new league publication, "What's the United States to You—A Quiz." Klamath Falls is fortunate in having state officers and chairmen of the organization, among them being Mrs. Twyla Ferguson and Mrs. John Yaden.

Members of the board were unanimous in feeling that it was a duty of the league to keep voters' responsibilities before the community, not alone at special meetings but throughout the entire year. To help with this the new quiz published by them "What's the U. S. to You" will be available to any citizen desiring a copy as soon as supplies are received from the national league. The pamphlet covers such subjects as the citizen's minimum responsibility toward better government; why party membership is important, and suggestions for study on things a voter needs to know. Over all other things the league emphasizes the need to stimulate citizen growth and participation in our representative democracy.

October 24 being the birthday of the United Nations organization, President Dorothea Buck plans on having a review of what the United Nations organization has accomplished to date, at the next meeting.
