I've never been happier about missing the prediction book.

I've been waiting all season for a sustained show of power from the Pelicans. They found it Friday night—and kept it.

When I witnessed the sharp passing attack and the emphatic, crisp blocking displayed by the Pelicans Friday night, I hastily checked the numbers on the program to be sure I was watching the Klamath eleven in action.

Friday night's Red Hurd Pelican gridder was a team that wouldn't be beaten. They were a bunch of fighting-shed kids who were out to prove to the town how wrong about 90 per cent of the population can be.

The Red-and-White team in action on Modoc Friday night could have beaten any team in the state, including the Grant Generals.

And they may get the chance to prove me right in this enthusiastic statement. The type of football dish-out by the Pelicans Friday night could push the Pel into the big show, the state play-off.

It is true that Jack Morris was favoring a sump skid Friday night. This was plainly evident when he carried the ball.

The Pel forward wall was charging hard. The Pelican backs were running hard, cutting sharp and fighting for yards. I've been hearing a second opinion that the Klamath coaching staff had forgotten to open the blocking page in the football book.

I'll take it back. The blocking was done with a vengeance. It was beautiful to watch Joe Demetras, Gene Carlson, Joe Nichols et al roll along behind blocking that was business-like and efficient.

I'm not writing this grid opus to crawl out of a doghouse. I still say I was not sold on the Pelicans B.M. (before Medford). But they employed the best method there is of selling themselves to this corner Friday night, to wit, workmanlike, inspired football.

The healthy part of the whole affair, in my opinion, is that this year's Pelican crew is a sincere, level-headed bunch that won't let Friday night's performance between their noggin's.

They're high now and, barring wholesale injuries, I think they'll stay that way.

Medford is entitled to praise for its touchdown drive when, trailing 9-31 in the last minute, chances of winning were slimmer than the possibility of Bowling Green beating Notre Dame.

Oregon Tech Loses, 55-14

The Owl spirit was more than willing, but the flesh was weak.

A big, crushing Southern Oregon line and fleet, slicing backs ripped an undermanned Oregon Tech eleven, 55 to 14, Saturday night on Modoc field before an estimated 2000 fans.

It was simply a case of too many good men against a small, injured Tech squad. Red Raider Coach Al Simpson had at least three backfield units and a change made little difference in the Ashland offensive power.

Strangely enough, the Owls scored first, 11 minutes into the first quarter. After a Raider punt, Halfback Ken Miller started a right end sweep, was cornered, reversed the field and outspurred the SOCE team to the goal line in a sudden 69-yard dash. Jack Taylor's kick was good and the Owls held a temporary 7-6 lead.

Three minutes later the Red Raiders knotted the count and went on to pile up four more touchdowns to hold a 35 to 7 halftime lead.

Don Campbell added the final touch to a 60-yard drive when he sliced off tackle for a 12-yard counter. Gale "Wimpy" Jones, Red Raider kicking specialist, kicked the first of his seven boots. Jones missed only one placement of eight during the evening's festivities.

CAMPBELL AGAIN

Early in the second quarter, Campbell added another touchdown with a seven-yard right end sweep. The Owls fumbled the first play after the kickoff and in three running plays Barney Riggs picked up 16 yards for the third score.

Another Owl fumble started the Raiders on their way after the next kickoff. Fullback Dean Weekley fumbled a SOCE recovered on the OTT 42. Halfback Jack Barger toted the ball in running plays to the 31, a 18-yard Owl penalty advanced the ball to the 15 and from there Baldy Foster, ex-Pelican ace, rifled a pass to big Tex Gallin.

John Pasach got off a weak 20-yard punt after the Owls failed to gain through the hard-charging Raider line and from the Owl 27-yard marker the Ashland team added the fifth score in four plays. The winning play was a flat pass from Harry Kammassie to Bill Giovanetti. The half ended 35 to 7.

The Red Raiders struck suddenly for their sixth score just two minutes into the second half. Tad Gaudes nestled Pasach's punt on the Owl 43 and raced down the sideline, after being apparently trapped at midfield, for the score. Jones missed his only try at extra point.

Hectic Pacific Coast Grid Week-end Sees Troy
Lose To California, UCLA Upset by Santa Clara

Coast college football picked up the pieces today after a nerve-shattering week-end that saw a couple of big ones knocked from the undefeated list.

New explosions may take place Saturday, particularly in the battle between Southern California and Oregon.

Southern California, pre-season favorite, had its championship hopes jolted to the foundations by a hard hitting California squad. Off their 16 to 10 upset win, the California Bears now rate first choice for the title and a second consecutive trip to the Rose Bowl.

California is the only coast conference team with an unblemished record, undefeated and untied either in or outside the loop. The Bears figure to continue pounding along the victory path. They take on luckless Washington this week. The Huskies are reeling under four straight losses.

The University of California at Los Angeles Bruins also boast a perfect conference mark of three wins at the moment. But they lost prestige as well as a game Saturday when Santa Clara racked up a 14-0 upset win. The Bruins should stay in conference contention through this week's play with a stronger brand of ball than exhibited to date. The Cougars clouted Idaho, 35-13 in their last out.

Stanford bounded back from a 7-14 defeat by UCLA to wallop Washington 40-0. Coach Marchie Schwartz' fast club will entertain an Oregon State squad which apparently has come to life after a couple of bad lickings. Oregon State rolled over Montana 63-14 last week following a 7-3 victory over Washington.

Some observers still like Stanford's chances in the conference chase in view of the Indians' loss spree against Washington. The loss to UCLA has been written off as one of those days when mistakes talked the better team.

This week's top game, however, will take place in Los Angeles. It will be make or break for either Oregon or Southern California.

Oregon punched out a 42-14 win over Colorado and showed impressive ground power to outclass the visitors from the big seven circuit. Jim Allen's Oregon outfit is in the same position as Southern California. It must win to stay in contention. Oregon has won two and lost one in the league. USC has a 1-1 record.

Idaho, beaten in its last three starts, and Montana, in its last two, tangle in their annual conference rivalry. The outcome looks like a toss-up.

Santa Clara will be prime favorites to beat an improving Loyola eleven at Sacramento Sunday.

Another Sunday clash will bring together St. Mary's and the University of San Francisco. USP won from a tough San Jose State club 27-20 last week.

Two quick, third period touchdowns: bounced St. Mary's Gaels from a halftime deficit into a 27-14 victory over Loyola of Los Angeles yesterday.

St. Mary's stopped the Lions cold in the second half and rolled up 329 yards to the Lions' 214.

Nevada will be favored to trim Fresno State this week following its 20-7 win over Wichita. College of the Pacific likewise rates strongly over San Diego State. The big COP team, with slick quarterback Eddie Lebaron at the helm, whacked University of Portland, 75 to 20.

TONY NELMS FIRST IN HEAVYWEIGHT
MUSCLE TOURNAMENT COMPETITION

Stocky little Dano Millucci, Multnomah Athletic club weight lifter from Portland, walked away with top honors at the Oregon state weight lifting championships at Klamath Union high school Saturday night.

Millucci, a 178-pound light heavyweight, hoisted a total of 745 pounds in the three event program.

In the two arm military press, powerful Dano set a new Oregon state record with a 255 pound lift.

His other efforts included a 210 lift in the two arm snatch, and 280 in the two arm clean and jerk.

Of the seven local men contending, Tony Nelms placed first in the heavyweight division and Frank Bechtel took a fourth.

Cecil Phillips huffed and puffed his way to a second behind Millucci in the light heavies, and Ingman Sabin ran third in the middleweights.

The lightweight division crown was taken by Leon Andreon, a local lad, who had a total of 405 pounds.

Other Klamath contenders were William Scarth and James Wright, who placed first and second in the featherweight branch.

Dick Munly, MAC, Portland, was the remaining first spot winner, taking the middleweight prize with his hoist of 665 total.
