

Adult Trial For Malin Boy Bandits

Two 16-year-old boys held for a Malin robbery will be turned over to adult court for prosecution. The boys are LeRoy Davis and William David Roach, who were brought into juvenile court before Judge David R. Vandenberg last Saturday.

Felony
After the juvenile proceedings, Judge Vandenberg said he would bind the teen-agers over to face a felony charge of armed robbery. They are the first persons of that age he has ordered into circuit court. Judge Vandenberg said Davis and Roach held up Howard Henderson, Great Northern freight agent at Malin, September 22, threatening the agent with a .38 calibre revolver and a knife, and took \$56.42 from the office safe.

Abduction
Then they forced Henderson into his car and drove south on Malin toward the state line where he was put out of the automobile. A short time later the two boys were apprehended at Canby, Calif. in Henderson's car and with the money in their possession.

Final rites will be held from Whitlock's chapel Wednesday at 1 p. m. with interment in Klamath Memorial park.

Seven New Oregon Armories Planned

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (AP)—Plans for seven new national guard armories in Oregon will be ready for action by December 1.

The state military department reported the \$600,000 program calls for buildings at Oregon City, Corvallis, Lebanon, Grants Pass, Bend, La Grande and Ontario.

Half of the fund was provided by the state legislature. The federal government matches the amount.

Burned Plane Found Again

For the second time, hunters have reported finding a burned C-47 plane in the Buck lake area, creating a flurry of excitement which died down quickly when it was announced as an old crash of war years.

Hal Ogle of the Klamath Forest Protective association said the plane, from a Medford air base, crashed in the fall of 1944 and at that time the pilot was killed and his passenger rescued and hospitalized here. Gordon Cox, then working on a Lake o' the Woods construction job for Bill von der Hellen of Medford, found the plane when he tracked into the forest after seeing the crash.

Ogle said that he was "up half the night" answering inquiries as to the plane and observed that some marker should be made at the spot in order to prevent further "R" reporting.

Yon Escapes State Prison

SALEM, Oct. 17 (AP)—A Klamath county convict up for parole escaped from the state penitentiary annex Saturday, along with another prisoner from Umatilla county, and were still at large today.

State Police identified the two as Roy Raymond Yon, 26, whose parole had already been approved, and Robert Elwin Foster, 21, serving two and a half years for larceny on a Pendleton conviction.

How the two got away from the prison annex was not revealed.

Forgery Count
Yon was sent up for three years from the Klamath county circuit court in September, 1948, for forgery, and had served over one third of his term. He would have been paroled as soon as a job could be found for him, prison officials said.

Yon is a former ranchhand for the Z-X ranch at Paisley. He is five feet, seven inches tall, weighs 148 pounds, blue eyes and brown hair.

Murder Charged In 2 Deaths

NEWPORT, Oct. 17 (AP)—Two first degree murder charges were filed here today against Norman Homer Edwards, 50, accused of shooting two brothers last week.

District Attorney Lewis English said he based the charges on the deaths of Melvin Longyear, 27, and his 22-year-old brother, Charles.

Their bodies were found on a brushy trail after Edwards had turned himself over to police with a statement he had "hurt" the brothers.

New Egg, Poultry Contract Offered

PORTLAND, Oct. 17 (AP)—A new contract offer was made today to the AFL egg and poultry workers who had threatened to strike today. The men went to work, and planned to meet tonight to vote on the proposal. Its terms were not disclosed, but the Federal Conciliator, George Walker, said he was "optimistic" about a settlement.

The two firms involved are Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association and Brentwood Egg company.

Judge Saves Boys From Explosion

SALEM, Oct. 17 (AP)—Circuit Judge Earl C. Latourette granted a temporary injunction today to restrain the Salem school board from expelling 19 high school boys.

The boys were expelled last week for membership in a high school secret society. The injunction was asked by their parents. The order means that the boys can be admitted to high school classes pending a hearing on whether the injunction should be made permanent. No date for this latter hearing was set.

Highway Crash Kills Six

FERRIDAY, La., Oct. 17 (AP)—An automobile slammed into a horse, bounced across the highway and crashed into another car last night, killing six persons and seriously injuring another.

The cars struck with such terrific impact they had to be pulled apart to remove the victims.

Killed were Cecil Sydney Camp of Baton Rouge, La., head of the hydraulics engineering department at Louisiana State university; his wife and their two children, Robert 10, and Arthur 9, Francis Mitchell, of Fayetteville, Ark., LSU engineering student, and Leo Jackson of Rayville.

A warrant charging drunk driving was filed against the driver of the second car in the accident, Warren Hathaway Foster of Keno.

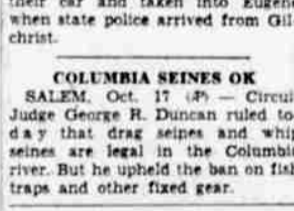
Willamette Wreck

New French Government Try Fails

PARIS, Oct. 17 (AP)—Julius Moch abandoned tonight his attempt to form a new French government, his socialist party announced.

The socialist leader, minister of interior in the cabinet of Premier Henri Queuille which resigned October 5, had been trying to form a government since Friday, when he was given a parliamentary vote of confidence by a narrow margin as the premier-designate.

Moch was unable to bridge the arguments between his socialist party and the other parties of the center, the popular republicans and the radical socialists, with whom he had been trying to form a new coalition.

Mrs. R. M. Slater, 81-year-old Portland resident and mother of Lawrence Slater, Klamath Falls insurance man, died at her home in Portland Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock following a brief illness. Her passing was unexpected.
