

81st Congress Nears Finish with Record Disputed by Leaders

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The 81st congress is nearing the end of its first session with its record certain to be a major issue next year.

Its leaders hope to adjourn sometime this week after more than two months of almost continuous session.

Depending on how you look at it, the record is either very good or very bad.

'Progress'

Senate Democratic Leader Lucas (D) handed President Truman a report yesterday which he said shows "outstanding progress in far-reaching progressive legislation" at this session.

Lucas told reporters the report was prepared by the staff of the senate's democratic policy committee.

He added that the president is happy and pleased at the progress in both houses.

Lucas talked with newsmen after the usual Monday conference of the president with democratic congressional leaders.

Adjournment

Rep. McCormack (Mass), democratic leader in the house, said that any agreement on a farm bill and the number of air groups to be financed by the military appropriation measure are needed to permit adjournment Wednesday.

Lucas said one of the first things the senate will do at its next session in January is to pass a bill for expanded social security. The house already has passed such a measure.

'Remarkable'

Presidential Secretary Charles Ross has described the record of the 81st as "rather remarkable," a summation in which democratic congressional leaders generally concur.

Republicans can't see it that way. Only yesterday Senator Wherry (R-Neb.) said congress under the democrats has been "poorly organized and weakly led." He added that campaign pledges of President Truman had turned out to be empty promises.

Group Fights For Passage Of DP Bill

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The citizens committee on displaced persons wants the senate to pass next January the now-shelved DP bill as it stands.

The legislation to bring in additional thousands of homeless Europeans to America, said this private group, should not be "mutilated and emasculated beyond recognition as the apparent attitude of Senator McCarran would portend."

The committee statement was distributed from New York by Earl G. Harrison, chairman. Harrison urged senate passage of the house-approved Celler bill "as the one measure that can liberalize the discriminatory DP act of 1948."

Measure Returned

The senate voted Saturday night, 26 to 30, to send the measure back to its judiciary committee. It recommended return of the bill next January 25.

Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) of the judiciary committee, now traveling in Europe, had urged that the senate take no action this year. He said the objectives of the bill, written by Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.), is to destroy immigration barriers and flood the country with aliens.

During debate on the bill, Senator Cain (R-Wash.) criticized the citizens committee headed by Harrison as a powerful lobby.

RED MARSHAL DIES

MOSCOW, Oct. 18 (AP)—Marshal Fedor I. Tolbukhin, who led Russian armies against the Germans in Bulgaria, Hungary and Austria in World War II, died yesterday at the age of 65.

Celilo Chief To Ask HST's Aid for Tribe

PORTLAND, Oct. 18 (AP)—The 85-year-old chief of the Celilo Indians told the chamber of commerce yesterday that he was going to protest to President Truman about the "invasion" of his tribe's rights.

Chief Tommy Thompson appeared in tribal regalia to complain that Indians without fishing rights have swarmed to Celilo falls on the Columbia river for the fall salmon season.

He also repeated his charge that the Indian service built a new village for his tribe without asking his advice.

Both charges are controversies of long standing. Some other Indian tribes contend they have not been given their full fishing rights at Celilo. As for the new village, the Indian service contends that every step was approved by the tribal council.

Army to Teach Military Tactics, Civilian Defense

The first of three classes regarding military tactics and civilian defense will be held here next Monday night by an augmentation squad of the army's organized reserve squad.

The meeting will be held at the courthouse at 8 p. m. and all members of the army, navy or marine reserves or national guard are invited to attend and participate.

Major Henry Peitola, a reserve officer on duty with the 6th army G-3 section, ORC division, will conduct the course in "policies and procedure of the organized reserve corps." He will be assisted by Sgt. Harold L. Hall.

Second Class

The second class will be held November 16 on the subject of staff coordination, functioning and liaison, and the third, on the subject of defense of the United States against attack by atomic bomb and guided missiles, will be held December 19.

Aussie Communist Gets 3 Years

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 18 (AP)—One of Australia's top communists was sentenced yesterday to three years at hard labor for having said Australian workers would welcome Soviet forces here.

Laurence Louis Sharkey, 51, general secretary of the Australian communist party, was convicted by a jury in central criminal court last June of having uttered seditious words. The sentence he received today is the maximum for such an offense.

House Pigeonholes Mine-aid Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The house yesterday virtually killed all hopes for mine-aid legislation at this session of congress.

It refused to suspend the rules and pass a bill to provide incentive payments for exploration and conservation of strategic minerals.

The vote was 176 to 118 to suspend the rules, but a two-thirds majority was necessary to make the motion effective.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 18 (AP)—Democrats announced opening of a campaign to elect a democrat from the district in 1950. Dr. Jay C. Hicks, Eugene, has been elected chairman of the new democratic congressional committee for this district.

Jim Goodsell, state democratic executive secretary, said democratic organizations of Cook, Douglas, Lane, Linn, Jackson, and Josephine counties were represented here Sunday, in a meeting marked by an unfettered off-the-record discussion of 21 potential congressional candidates.

The latter is a brother to State Senator Austin Flegel of Portland.
