Huskies Will be 'Harty'

SEATTLE, Oct. 18 (AP)—Washington's football Huskies may just be limping instead of crippled for this Saturday's clash with California at Berkeley.

Left Halfback Billy Kirkby, Fullback Hugh McElhenny, Tackles George Bayer and Loren Perry and Fullback Hank Tiedemann all were in uniform for yesterday's light workout. All but Tiedemann were injured early in the Stanford slaughter last Saturday. Tiedemann has been out for three weeks with illness and flu.

SEATTLE, Oct. 18 (AP)—A San Diego baseball trade involving the Padres' veteran catcher, Dee Moore, and Tony York, Seattle's utility infielder, was rumored today.

Earl Sheryl, general manager of the Rainiers, said he had talked with President William Star of the Padres by telephone, but would not disclose the individuals involved.

Secret School Clubs Fought In Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 18 (AP)—The Portland school board set up plans yesterday to do away with secret societies in high schools.

After voting unanimously again to ban the societies, the board approved recommendations of Superintendent Paul A. Rehms.

He asserted present organizations will be given time to disband, and those that can meet standards set up by the school administration will be approved.

Qualifications To meet standards a club would have to have an authorized adult sponsor present through each meeting. Its list of members and officers would be given to the school. It could not be affiliated with any national or local secret society, could not have secret initiations, conduct parties without chaperones or conduct rushing parties.

Wreck Injuries Prove Fatal CORVALLIS, Oct. 18 (AP)—Injuries from an automobile accident were fatal last night to Karl Horton, an automobile salesman here and former city recorder of Albany.

Honors Heaped on Los Angeles Sports Patron

Philanthropist Helms Receives AAU, FWA Awards

AP Newfeatures LOS ANGELES—National recognition has come to multi-millionaire Paul H. Helms of Los Angeles, a philanthropic sports enthusiast long established as one of California's most generous patrons of athletics.

Helms, a baking business tycoon with a physique as sturdy as a lightweight champion despite his 60 years, recently was tendered two honors of coast to coast distinction.

The amateur athletic union of the U. S. appointed him an AAU delegate at large, an honor bestowed on such distinguished gentlemen as Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Amos Alonzo Stagg and a few others.

In August the Football Writers Association of America, meeting in Chicago, named Helms an honorary member, one of a scant few individuals so designated by this organization.

These tributes are treasured things to take a place along with innumerable other citations for unstinting support of all things athletic, amateur or professional.

A partial run down would include a collection of lifetime passes to major and minor league baseball games (he pays his way to all events regardless); chairmanship of the Southern California Olympic Games committee; member of the Southern California Tennis Patrons association; the local football writers' chapter, underwriter, at a cost of some \$25,000, of an invitational basketball tournament, and many other similar honors and activities.

Typical, it might be noted, was the presence of 90 underprivileged youngsters at a recent professional football game—all guests of Helms.

Base of the Helms fortune is a vast baking company he established here around 1926. He came here from New York and Buffalo where his business acumen had been demonstrated previously.

He was born at Ottawa, Kan. Sept. 19, 1889, attended public schools in Buffalo and graduated with a BA degree from Syracuse university in 1912. Last year the university conferred an LL.D on him.

Base of the Helms sports patronage is the Helms Athletic foundation and Helms Hall.

The foundation is directed by Helms' indefatigable chief lieutenant, W. R. (Bill) Schroeder. It conducts extensive research, boasts

one of the finest sports libraries and museums in the country, and each year honors with trophies and medals literally hundreds of athletes, young and old, past and present, in all categories of sport. Mr. Helms has spent more than \$250,000 on the foundation since it came into existence in 1936.

Helms Hall is the building, hard by the main Helms baking plant in suburban Culver City which will cost close to \$500,000 when all units are completed in 1950. It houses the foundation and its staff.

It is the scene of many sports gatherings, is open to the public and is a haven at all hours of the night or day for harassed sports and radio people in need of background material.

Helms also is active in numerous civic matters not pertaining to sports, and his easy, good humored approach to any subject belies his intense enthusiasm and energy.

He names baseball as his favorite spectator sport. He thinks there is no thrill greater than a World Series ball game. But he can still reel off

the sequence of plays that led up to that dramatic last minute 16-14 victory of Southern California. The same goes for a sprint race crew, a basketball contest, a championship tennis match. —Paul Hoy Helms can discourse at length, and with astonishing technical skill, on most any given sport.

It is a mystery how the man manages to operate and correlate all of his many interests — Business sports, civic welfare, the grand opera, social rounds.

There must be two Paul H. Helms. There must be, except that there can't be but one.

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AAC PROS FILL GRIDIRON BILL

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—For football fans who like their games wide open with plenty of scoring, the All-America conference this year is filling the bill.

The AAC attacked-minded members are averaging close to 50 points a game and setting all sorts of records for piling up figures on the scoreboard.

A week ago the conference set a three-game record with a total of 216 points. Last week-end the boys rang up 178 points in three games. In the last nine games, the average has been 65.2. That's better than a point a minute.

The San Francisco Forty-Niners, leading the league with six victories in seven starts, are setting the offensive pace with a total of 281 points. They have scored 107 in their last two outings.

San Francisco also is tops in rushing with an average of 268.1 yards a game. The New York Yankees follow at 196 and Los Angeles is third at 155.1.
