

Business Gloom Eases with Look At 81st Congress

NEW YORK, Oct. 19 (AP)—Businessmen who were so gloomy when the 81st congress was elected less than a year ago find today that on the whole its bark was worse than its bite.

But, as the first session moves to a wrangling, uncertain close, many businessmen find its record, at best, a mixed blessing. Many of the things they dislike most merely are put off until January. Businessmen were not united, either. Few were the measures before congress that didn't find businessmen appearing on both sides of the issue.

Fears Fruitless

Congress failed to fulfill businessmen's worst fears of a year ago. For example, congress didn't repeal the Taft-Hartley law, or increase taxes. And it sidetracked health insurance, the Brannan farm plan and social security extension, all of which had bitter opponents in the business world. But most of these issues are likely to come up again in January.

Huge appropriations for foreign aid and both American and European rearmament made for less of a drop in exports and in factory and mill orders than businessmen had been braced for this year. However, these same appropriations mean continued high taxes. Some companies wonder whether their gains as suppliers equal their loss as taxpayers.

Deficit Financing

Most of congress' acts tended to brake deflation or to promise future inflationary pressures. And their sum total—higher expenditures and lower tax collections—led the treasury to deficit financing, which many regard as the most inflationary item of all at the present time.

The public in general, however, appeared to lose interest in threats of future inflation, despite some warnings these were increasing, and to concentrate on signs that deflation was being held in check.

Just who will gain and who will lose by individual measures—in dollars and cents, without questioning their political or moral benefits?

World Trade Boost

Most firms with goods to export feel that the Marshall plan extension will help keep world trade moving. Everyone with taxes to pay will contribute his bit to it. The majority of those directly engaged in exporting and importing hope to gain by the extension of reciprocal trade agreements, but some domestic manufacturers see costly competition in their own particular fields. Most exporters deplore the need to continue export controls as an expensive nuisance.

Texan Gets 10 Years For Forgery

Husky Charles E. Bryant, 28-year-old Texan, was sentenced yesterday afternoon to serve 10 years in the Oregon state prison after pleading guilty to four forgeries.

He appeared before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, and was prosecuted for forging the name of Jerry Rajnus, Malin farmer, on a check for \$47.12.

Bryant admitted another check for \$47.12, one for \$12 and one for \$16.

He said he had been released from the Huntville, Tex., state prison May 11 after serving a two-year term for forgery. Bryant became the 44th person sent to the state prison from Klamath county this year.

Two Children Burn to Death

CHEHALIS, Oct. 19 (AP)—Two children were burned fatally yesterday by fire that destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur McCormick at Bunker Creek, 10 miles west of Chehalis.

The two victims, Sheila, 3, and Kathy, 17 months, were in bed with colds. Their mother had placed a vaporizer on an electric plate. The fire was beyond control when noticed by Mrs. McCormick. Flames made rescue of the children impossible.
