

State Supreme Court Upholds Curfew Laws

HALEM, Oct. 19 (AP)—The state supreme court ruled yesterday that it's OK for cities to have curfew laws to prevent persons from being on public streets unless they have lawful purposes.

The court specifically upheld the Portland curfew ordinance. It provides that no person can be on a public street or in a public place between the hours of 1 and 5 a. m. unless he has and discloses a lawful purpose.

'Reasonable'
The court, in its decision by Justice James T. Brand, said curfew laws are a reasonable police power which is necessary to keep criminals off the streets.

The case was started by Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Goodwin. They were arrested and each fined \$25 under the ordinance because they refused to disclose a lawful purpose for being on the street during the curfew hours.

They appealed to Circuit Judge Walter L. Toose, who ruled in their favor and held that the ordinance violated the constitution.

Yesterday's decision reversed Judge Toose.

KUHS Group To Enter Speech Trial

Chuck Woodhouse, in charge of the division of radio speech at KUHS, announced this morning that Klamath Union high school will be represented in the "Speak for Democracy" contest in November by Senior Student Benn Roufs.

Roufs won the school contest Monday afternoon. He is the first of the county high school students to qualify for the big county-wide public speaking contest which could mean a trip to Washington, D. C., a luncheon with President Truman, numerous expensive gifts, including a 4-year scholarship to any university or college in America.

Sacred Heart academy's Francis Hallinan copped the county championship last year but placed fourth in the state trials.

Locally numerous merchants will shower the contestants with expensive gifts regardless of whether they win the county championship. Dick Reeder's store for men will present the male winner with a \$50 gift certificate, and in the event the champ is a girl, LaPointe's will present her with a \$50 gift certificate. Deadline for qualifying is November 5, according to Junior chamber of commerce committee head, Bill Wentworth.

Congress OK's Wind Tunnel Funds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—Congress sent to the White House yesterday a compromise bill authorizing a \$252,000,000 program for developing transonic and supersonic wind tunnels.

Both the house and senate agreed to the measure within a short time yesterday.

The money will be used partly in cooperation with educational institutions and partly through a new air engineering development center.

Portland Gets Low-Cost Housing Aid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—The public housing administration assigned 2000 units of low-cost housing yesterday to Portland, Ore., and 1000 to Phoenix, Ariz.

Local housing authorities asked for loans to pay for planning as follows:

Portland \$350,000, and Phoenix \$250,000.

These loans are subject to approval by President Truman. In addition the government will lend up to 90 per cent of construction costs, if private financing is not available.

Bureau Reports Bad Fire Season

PORTLAND, Oct. 19 (AP)—Range and forest land of Southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon administered by the bureau of land management had 161,835 fire-swept acres this year.

Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator, called the fire season,



marked by unusual drought, one of the most disastrous in several years. There were 379 fires.

He said ranchers and townspeople, who turned out en masse when fires occurred, prevented more serious loss.
